—The steamer Joe Milton brought over 60 passengers from Cleveland yesterday.

—Mrs. Cavanagh, Winnipeg, and her sister, Mrs. Rawlings, of Forest, have been visiting Mrs. Gray, King street.

—Mr. Carl Beal returned yesterday (Monday) to Toronto and resumed his position with the Grip Printing Company.

—Mrs. Campbell, Mrs. Rogers and Miss Jennie Campbell, of Cleveland, have taken a cottage for a month in Port Stanley, where they have many friends.

—The Flora arrived at Port Monday morning from Cleveland, and left at once for the other side in order to commence her regular run. She carried about 50 passengers from Port.

—The crowds down the river yesterday were the largest of the season. Capt. Foster's steamer was loaded every trip. A good many people stepped at Woodland Cemetery to decorate graves.

## AN UNBIASED VERDICT.

"The theory of the members of the Canadian Government, who are carrying on this tariff inquiry, is that protection is to be continued until the several manufacturers are self-supporting; and that manufacturers are to be kept on to equalize while duties are to be kept on to equalize the difference between the rates of interest and wages in Canada and foreign countries."

The pretense is that the farmer is to share protection along with the manufacturer. This is a feat which no tariff can accomplish. It is a feat which no tariff can accomplish. It is a feat which no tariff can accomplish.

How is it attempted to be done? By imposing duties on farm produce. But the country grows such produce in excess of its own wants; the surplus, which finds a market in England, has to be sold at a price determined by the proportion of the world's supply to the world's demand; and the price obtained for the surplus fixes the price of the whole, including what is required for the country for consumption. The tariff on here has no effect in determining the English price, which the Canadian, like that of every other exporting country, has to follow. If from local or accidental causes the Canadian price is sometimes enhanced through the duty, the incident only marks the exception to the rule; and we should delude ourselves if we accepted an exception for the rule. This is what we are asked to do.

Of the case of the farmers, the largest body of producers in the country, protection cannot equalize the difference in wages and in interest. It is obvious that it fails to attain the first object of its existence. And it fails to equalize the rates of interest in as it can equalize the rates of interest in two different countries, only by enhancing profit through an increase of price, it equally fails, in its application to agriculture, to equalize the rates of interest in the same manner. And yet we are told that a system which thus fails to be continued until an equalization of the rates of wages and interest between Canada and other countries is, by some persons, a process, brought about, through how this is done, we are not informed. Does any one expect to see the day when the rate of interest in Canada will fall to the Dutch level? Does any one expect to live on the same day when wages will be on the same level? Does any one expect to see the day when the levelling process to proceed? Is the levelling to be upwards or downwards, or is it to move from both directions at the same time? The chances are that these same talk glibly about the future equilibrium of wages and of interest on money, have never attempted even to imagine how the process is to be worked out. One thing is certain, exaggerated protection, while it lasts, imposes sacrifices on the community by enhancing prices to the whole body of consumers. This might be borne with if the compensation were sure to be paid in the near future; but if we are to wait for the benefits which the sacrifice was intended to purchase until interest and wages attain a common level, in different countries, the sacrifices will bring nothing but disappointment.
