Inexhaustible Supply of Pulp Wood and Nickel,

The London Board of Trade Sign a Petition for an Export Duty on Pulp Wood - Agitation by the Laboring Men.

A meeting of the ways and means committee of the Board of Trade met yesterday afternoon to hear Mr. P. J. Loughrin, of Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., regarding the pulp wood and nickel industries of Canada. Mr. Loughrin represents the American Federation of Labor, and is the general labor organizer for the Dominion. He is seeking the co-operation of the Boards of Trade and municipal councils in urging that an export duty of not less than \$2 per cord be imposed on pulp wood, and also an export duty on nickel, and an

'We have practically an inexhaustible supply of pulp wood and nickel," he said. He quoted from Lockwood's latest directory to show that there were 122 idle pulp mills in the world. Only four of these mills were Canadian, and they used only 12 tons annually. This went to show that there was a dearth of raw material in the majority of cases, and that they would look to Canada for the supply. The Niagara mills could buy 10,000 cords of pulp wood in Canada for almost nothing, and manufacture it across the border, where a labor line is drawn, which the Candian laborer could not

Mr. Loughrin also brought up the matter of an export duty on nickel, but did not ask for a resolution. He of an export duty on nickel, explained that the by-products in the manufacture of nickel were valuable in making pulp, and said if pulp mills were established here, nickel could be produced cheap enough to come into universal use A resolution was passed unanimously asking that an export duty of not less than \$2 per cord be imposed by the Government on pulp wood exported from Canada.
