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Dreyfus Found Guilty.

Tonight's cablegrams bring the conclusion of the Dreyfus trial. He has been found guilty, and sentenced to ten years' imprisonment! That Dreyfus is an innocent man, no unprejudiced outsider for a moment doubts. The sort of evidence on which he has been found guilty and sentenced to ten years' imprisonment, would not in any part of the British Empire imprison a dog. Poor Dreyfus is to be pitied, but not so much as France, whch stands before the world as a country where an innocent man may, through racial prejudice, and for suppressed reasons of state policy, be deliberately declared guilty. Dreyfus is not a free man, but he has the satisfaction of having had his honor vindicated in the presence of hundreds of representatives of the press, who will proclaim the facts to

the ends of the earth. We cannot believe that Dreyfus will be long imprisoned. Probably, after a short interval, his sentence will be commuted. But nothing can wipe out the disgrace of his unjust conviction.

CONVENTION

To Be Held in London Next Week-In-

teresting Topics of Discussion. The provincial convention of health officers will meet in London on Wednesday and Thursday next, Sept. 13 and 14. The attendance is expected to be large, as in additional to delegates from all the Ontario municipalities, the members of the provincial board of health will be here, and a number of American sanitarians are also expected. The sessions will open in the city hall Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock, when the convention will be received by the chairman of the local board of health, ex-Ald. Charles Taylor. The Wednesday afternoon session will be devoted to the subject of tuberculosis. While all the sessions are open to the public, they are especially invited to the Wednesday evening meeting, when the mayor will give an address of welcome to the delegates, and the president's annual address will be delivered. The subject of ventilation and heating will also be discussed. The Thursday morning session will be of special interest to our citizens, as it will be given over to the consideration of the proper disposal of sewage. Thursday afternoon will be occupied with a discussion on typhoid fever. The officers will also be elected. At all these meetings papers will be read on the various subjects by eminent sanitarians; and the discus-
