THE ACTION OF FRANCE APPROVED .

Opinion Favors London France in Her Course Toward Turkey.

No Naval Action Has Yet Been Taken by France.

The Sultan's Army on Strike-Natives Looted \$600,000 Worth of the Steamer Asturia's Cargo.

London, Aug. 22 .- Diplomatic opinion in London, generally, approves of the French action toward Turkey. It appears that the chancellories of Europe have been considerably annoyed by the sultan's recent efforts to reassert himself and to shake off the limited control exercised by Europe over certain parts of his administration. The sultan's dispatch of a mission to the far east was also displeasing to the great powers. The latter, therefore, are expected to generally wel-come France's rebuff of the sultan. THE STORY OF THE TROUBLE.

The sultan at the last audience which he granted to M. Constans, the French ambassador, agreed to send the latter the same or the following day, a document giving complete sat-isfaction to France regarding the claims of French citizens in the matter of quays, in accordance with the terms arranged between the sultan and M. Constans verbally. Instead of doing this, the sultan waited until Tuesday, when he sent M. Constans a document in which the terms dif-fered essentially from those arranged at the audience. Thereupon M. Constans declined to negotiate any further or to hold other communications with the porte, and referred the matter to the French foreign office. As the matter stands, relations between M. Constans and the porte are broken off, but France and Turkey are still in diplomatic relations through Turkish ambassador at Paris. If the sultan does not keep the promises which he made at the last audience, M. Constans will be recalled.

No naval action on the part of France has yet been decided on. stories in the papers to the effect that French warships are under orders to be in readiness to proceed to the Bosphorus have no foundation, in fact. Such a measure might, of course, become necessary, but that eventually has not yet been considered by the French Government.

SULTAN'S ARMY ON STRIKE. Constantinople, Aug. 22. - Owing to arrears in pay the Turkish army is in a state bordering on anarchy. The garrison of Adrianople threatened to burn the governor's house and hold him captive unless money matters were The porte sent a courier to pay the men and trouble was averted. The sultan is terrified by the actions

Paris, Aug. 22. — The Matin this morning announces that the French second-class cruiser Cassard started for Turkish waters yesterday and that a naval division is ready to follow. GOT \$600,000 IN LOOT.

Rome, Aug. 22. — A dispatch from Aden gives details of the wreck of the German steamship Asturia from Yokohama, April 19, for New York, which went ashore at Ras Jard Hafun, on the coast of Somaliland. The vessel had a cargo of the value of \$600,000. The crew of the Asturia were rescued by an English steamship. The natives carried off the cargo. The Italian cruiser Cristofero Colombo, which arrived at this time, fired on the natives, killing many of them. The goods were not recovered, however.

FIFTEEN WERE DROWNED. Brest, Aug. 22.—A vessel carrying passengers between Plubian and Crescent, capsized at Triguer, fifteen persons being drowned, including the family of Anatole Lebranz, the novelist.
