## Fighting Hector MacDonald Kills Himself at Paris

Was to Have Been Courtmartialed on a Serious Charge.

Has an Unusually Fine War Record-Beloved by His Men.

MacDonald Left England For the Continent Some Days Ago by Advice of Lord Roberts.
