# NO MYSTERY!

Mrs. Hall' Explains 'Husband's' Masquerading as a Male.

Found It Gave Her Freedom of Action and Insured Safety in Traveling.

New York, Oct. 5. - The story of Miss Caroline Winslow Hall, who died on the steamer Citta di Torina last Monday, and who for years had masqueraded in men's clothing in Italy and elsewhere, as told by Miss Rosalia Baldelli, who has passed as Hall's wife, is interesting.

Miss Baldelli, or "Mrs. Charles Winslow Hall," as her "husband" called her, is unable to speak English, and converses in Italian through an inter-preter. She is of medium size, has dark hair and eyes, and is quite of an Italian type. Seated in the saloon of the ship she said, with an occasional outburst of tears: "I met Caroline Winslow Hall ten years ago while living in Milan, Italy, where I was engaged as a teacher in a government school. She told me that she was an American, that her name was Caroline Winslow Hall and that her home was in Boston. She explained that she was attending an art school, having come to Italy for the purpose of studying

We were mutually attracted almost at once. She was very engaging and fascinating, of much intellect, and I felt drawn toward her. One day she told me she had no sisters or prothers, and that she desired me to take the place of a sister. From that time we were together almost constantly. She was then attending the Breize Art School in Milan. The students were nearly all young men and Miss Hall therefore adopted a man's ccat and trousers as a working costume, as did the other female students.

"After she left the art school we traveled through !taly and elsewhere together. It was not until 1897 that she decided to assume the guise of a man, because she believed we would be subjected to less annoyance if she were men's clothing. She assumed the name of Charles Winslow Hall, and said that I should take the name of Guisepanni Hall, her wife. We tra-veled for three years more, and at

no time was her sex questioned. 'Just before her death she told me she desired me to have all her propertv. I do not know what I shall do now that she is gone, for I loved her so.' Caroline Hall was an admin

nitator of Rosa Bonheur, the animal painter. She was be hter of John R. Hall, a wellknown Boston architect. "Miss Hall was eccentric," said a relative, "and that is all there is in

the whole matter. She left here to go abroad when she was about 17 years old. Her mother, a Boston woman and very fond of art, went with her and remained abroad about five years before returning to this country. "Miss Hall had been abroad all the time for the last 20 years, except for a

time about nine years ago, when she accompanied her mother on one of her trips home. She and her mother have a country place just outside Milan, where Miss Hall enjoyed her outdoor life and spent much time shooting and lunting. She was a good shot with a rifle, and when on her hunting trips she was accustomed to dress in men's freedom, of course, and nothing was thought of it over there

"In fact. I believe her change to men's clothing as her permanent dress came about because of her liking fo the hunting costume; for she was not regarded by any of her relatives as anything but sound in mind. There was no insanity about it. The Italian woman mentioned in the morning dispatches, I believe, was an artist friend of Miss Hall, who had spent much time with her at Milan, and who work-
