Brussels, Nov. 17 .- The police have arrested an Englishman, James Hardie, on suspicion of his having been connected with the attempt made Saturday by Robini on the life of King Leopold.

Hardie turns out to be James Keir Hardie, M. P. (the former chairman of the Independent Labor party and well known labor leader). He was subsequently released and lodged a complaint at the British legation. Apparently the police were ignorant of his identity and in spite of his protests he was taken to a police sta-

Mr. Hardie threatens to make his arrest an international affair, and will appeal to the British Foreign Office immediately after he returns to England. He says that he had a postal remittance telegraphed to him, addressed to the "Maison do Peuple," and that the police, through a breach of confidence, became cognizant thereof. After Mr. Hardie's arrival at the police station the officers asked him if he knew Robini, and he was released only when he proved he was a member of the British House of Jom-

## **DEADLY WORK** OF DYNAMITE

Two Men Killed and Several Others Injured-Ten Buildings Were Wrecked.

Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 18. - A fire which broke out in the freight depot of the Southern Railway at Pell City, six miles east of here, early yesterday morning, was followed by a terrific explosion of dynamite, which killed two persons and injured ten, two perhaps fatally. The dead are: J. D. Hall, merchant, Pell City; Thomas Whitfield, brick mason, Cedartown, Ga. Among the injured are: Hon. N. B. Spears, ex-member of the Alabama Legislature and Republican candidate for Congress in the seventh district two years ago, perhaps fatally injured; Engineer John Griffin, fatally injured, and D. A. Pike, agent Seaboard Air Line

When the fire was discovered, the night operator gave the alarm by repeatedly firing a revolver. This aroused the citizens, who ran to the scene to help save the freight. They forgot the five cases of dynamite were stored in the place, and the explosion operators while explosion occurred while a large crowd of citizens and railroad men were near the scene. Ten business houses, including the Pell City Hotel, were wrecked, causing a heavy loss. Two freight trains on the siding were got-ten away in time to save them. Several injured were brought here.
