NEARING THOUSAND MARK

Dundas Center Methodist School Has Over 900 Members.

Annual Meeting Shows the Progress That Has Been Made.

The annual meeting of the board of management of Dundas Center Methodist Bible school was held last evening. The pastor, Rev. C. T. Scott, B.A., occupied the chair, and the attendance was very large. The reports presented by the various officers were of a very encouraging nature and showed that the school had made considerable progress during the year.

The superintendent, Mr. A. McDermid, in his report, after referring to the general satisfactory condition of the school, gave it as his opinion that the Sunday school superintendent of the future would be a graduate of a training school, and will not only be familiar with the most approved methods of school management, but will be able to instruct teachers in teaching methods, so that their work will be made easier, and at the same time more effective. "Every theological school," he said, "should include in its curriculum a course of instruction in the various school methods and teaching; and thus every pastor would be a Sunday school expert. Less preaching and more teaching will characterize the work of the church in the good time coming."

The grading superintendent, Mr. M. W. Althouse, presented his report, which stated that the usual promotions had been made, and expressed satisfaction that the changes had met with the approval of the teachers. The work was made more effective by the fact that most of the classes have kept the same teacher throughout the entire year.

Mrs. James H. Bowman, superintendent of the home department, reported a membership of 142, a net increase of 11 over the previous year. The contributions amounted to \$109.55, an increase of \$33.08. Every class in the department was in good shape. The average attendance for the year was 167, an increase of 11 over the previous year. The highest attendance for the year was 263 last year. The classes having the highest attendance for the year were: First, Miss Bradford; second, Miss Willie; third, Miss Riddle. The banner for the year was won by Miss Bradford's class with 55 stars as against 54 stars the previous year. The classes having the largest weekly average collections were: First, Miss Martindale; second, Miss L. Donald; third, Miss Riddle. The average amount contributed by each person per Sunday was 2-1/2 cents.

The financial statement for the year was presented by the treasurer, Mr. L. W. Noble. It showed a satisfactory increase. The balance at the beginning of the year was \$1,102.56, the receipts totaled \$332.47, an aggregate of \$1,435.03. The disbursements were \$74.15, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,360.88, of this amount \$1,099.13 belongs to the primary building fund; \$22.86, to the missionary fund; and \$28.89, to the regular fund.

Mr. F. W. Daly, B.A., the librarian, made a strong plea for new library books, and after some discussion it was decided to make an annual grant of \$50 for that purpose.

The cradle roll report was read by the superintendent of that department, Mrs. Wm. Heaman, and showed the membership to be 45. A birthday card had been sent to each member.

The election of officers and teachers for the ensuing year resulted as follows: D. A. McDermid, superintendent; William Yeates, A. N. Udy and C. E. German, assistant superintendents; Charles E. Cowley, general secretary; L. W. Noble and F. P. Williams, assistant secretaries; Lew A.

OLCOTT SANG AS OF OLD

Irish Comedian Again Appears Before London Audience.

Has Lost Little of His Charm and Effectiveness.

Chauncey Olcott, sweet singer, Irish comedian, romantic actor, appeared at the Grand last night in "Terence," a dramatization of B. M. Croker's novel. Mr. Olcott is today the leader in that school of drama of which Joe Murphy and Andrew Mack are shining lights, and which was originated by the late lamented W. J. Scanlan. From the "Kerry Gow," first of the species, to "Terence," there has been little variation. As a basis there is a hero, necessarily handsome, and here—villainous—robbed of his birthright—and a collection, beautiful and big-hearted. You pepper this with a trifle of landlording and English oppression, throw in a love-song or a lullaby, and always introduce or refer to the "Harp That Once Through Tara's Hall."

Mr. Olcott has lost little of his charm and effectiveness since his last appearance in London. He is still good to look at, a wholesome, healthy, and fashionable, and if he is getting somewhat fat—which sooner or later spells ruin to your romantic actor—he still retains the old-time clarity of voice and richness of brogue. He sings with fascinating ease, and a refreshing lack of self-consciousness. "My Own Dear Irish Queen," and the lullaby, "My Sonny Boy," were especially effective.

As for the play, while commonplace and the usual complications, which Mr. Olcott's songs being introduced with some respect for the rules of dramatic construction, Terence is really a gentleman, masquerading as a coachman, and becomes involved in a love affair with an English heiress. There are the usual complications, which threaten the happiness of the pair, due to the intriguing of a blackguard English captain, by the way, excellently played by Mr. H. S. Nordrup. In due season, everything rights itself—virtue triumphs, villainy foiled, true hearts united, wedding bells.

Mr. Olcott's support, apart from Mr. Nordrup, was only fair. The mounting and costuming were first-class.

FALLS STRIKERS RESUME WORK

The Militia Guard Has Been Withdrawn Permanently.

ATTEMPT TO SHOOT OUT LIGHTS

By Foreign Rioters—Private of the Forty-Fourth Tickers Trouble—Flaker With Bayonet.

Niagara Falls, Nov. 5.—The guard of militia was withdrawn this evening and sent home. A small guard of special constables will be kept on duty. About sixty per cent of the strikers have returned to work at \$1.50 per day. About 150 of the strikers have left the town, and about 20 of the rioters are in jail at Welland. This has taken all the fire out of the balance behind on the works.

Several shots were heard at Dufferin Island at midnight. Soldiers advanced and found all quiet. The report was an attempt to shoot the lights out. Private Sloggett, of No. 1 Company, Forty-fourth Regiment, took a fairly loaded .38-caliber revolver from an Italian near the clay pits yesterday afternoon. Sloggett was a sentry on an advanced position. The Italian came on a bicycle. When halted he drew a revolver and threatened to shoot. Sloggett presented his own rifle and ordered the Italian to the fence with his bayonet. The Italian threw down his revolver, and as Sloggett stooped to get it, jumped on the wheel and got away. An Italian man then tried to pass the sentry near the works was tickled with a bayonet and fled. Several South African veterans have joined the volunteers on duty. It is reported that the contractors will bring in hundreds of men to replace the strikers. This is sure to cause trouble. The carpenters, masons, stone-cutters, steam engineers, rock drillers and other labor unions, whose members in large numbers are engaged on the power works, are taking no action whatever in connection with the strike. The union men sympathize heartily with the strikers in their fight against the decrease in pay, but have done nothing to assist them. All those driven from work by the rioters went back at the earliest opportunity.

Public sympathy is with the men so far as the strike goes, but of course no one indorses their action in rioting and attacking other men. The idleness of so many men has done more of others will seriously affect the business of merchants in some parts of the city.

THE MOROCCAN WAR

Sultan Abandons Campaign Through Lack of Funds.

London, Nov. 6.—It is believed here that the abandonment by the Sultan of Morocco of his struggle against the rebels, as recently announced in news dispatches, is due to the fact that his resources have become exhausted.

The correspondent of the Standard at Tangier makes the interesting announcement that Lord Lansdowne, British Foreign Minister, and M. Delcasse, French Foreign Minister, have practically arranged an Anglo-French loan for Morocco of \$10,000,000. The details, adds the correspondent, have not been completed, but it is probable that the loan will be guaranteed on the customs.
