SEINE RISING AGAIN

Melting Snow Sends Waters Up Nine Inches in Twenty-Four Hours.
Paris, Feb. 9.—The River Seine has risen nine inches in this city during the last twenty-four hours. The rise is due to yesterday's rain and melting snow. Although confident that there is no danger of a repetition of the recent disaster, the authorities are taking thorough precautions. The return of high water threatens to retard the work of repair which is in progress. The waters, which have dropped below the mouths of the sewers, are again pouring into the streets, drowning out the electric light and power lines in the vicinity of the Place de l'Opera. While the city has resumed on several sections of the boulevard, the management holds out no hope that the main line passing St. Lazare station will be restored for another month.

GUSTAV BETTER.

Stockholm, Feb. 9.—King Gustav, who was operated upon for appendicitis Monday night, slept well, with brief waking intervals from 2 o'clock last night until 7 o'clock this morning. Sunday his majesty showed some signs of fatigue, but suffered no pain. His temperature was 98.7, pulse 54.

NON-SUITED.

Toronto, Feb. 9.—Because it was clearly shown that he had stepped off the car backwards while it was running very fast, James A. Williamson, a retired farmer of Brandon, Man., was non-suited today in the assize court in an action against the Toronto street railway. Williamson had no knowledge of the occurrence, but his own witnesses gave the evidence which caused Chief Justice Falconbridge to take the case from the jury.

AN EXPERT ON RABIES APPROVES THE ORDER

Says Measure Taken by Canada Is Safest and Cheapest Way to Act.

New York, Feb. 9.—A number of cases of rabies from Ontario have been brought to the attention of the Institute here during recent years. In 1906 there was one case, in 1907 none, in 1908 six, in 1909 twenty-two. During the first six weeks of the new year, fifteen cases of rabies have been reported, and the case-taking treatment now are made up thus:

Three from Tilbury.
Two from Strathroy.
Two from Atwood.
One from Grimsby.

All the other cases have been cured, and those here now are on their way to recovery. It is impossible to get the names of the patients.

Dr. George G. Rumbold, director of the Institute, says regarding the order of the Canadian Government that all dogs shall be tied up or muzzled in Western Ontario: "It is the safest, easiest and cheapest plan to eradicate an outbreak of rabies. A dog bitten by a dog having rabies should be quarantined for at least five months, as 99 per cent will develop rabies in three months and 1 per cent in five or six months."

New York, Feb. 9.—A gascock, half-shut by a sleepy boarder, before he tumbled into bed, brought death to three sleepers, William and Alexander Robertson, brothers, and William Thompson, in a South Brooklyn boarding-house today.

TRAGEDY IN BEER TANK

While Having Interior Varished Vat Explodes and Burns Cleaners.

Fort William, Feb. 10.—A loud explosion and a burst of flame came from a beer tank at the Kakabeka brewery. Then Joseph Eddy was seen fighting his way out of the narrow manhole. At the top he turned round and managed to extricate his companion, Fred Widnall, who was in a ring of flames. The two men, badly burned, were rushed to the hospital, where Widnall has some chance of recovery and Eddy practically none.

The cause of the explosion will not be known till one of the injured men can make a statement. They were varnishing the interior of the tank at the time, and it is surmised that, contrary to rule they carried an extension light which ignited the alcohol in the varnish.
