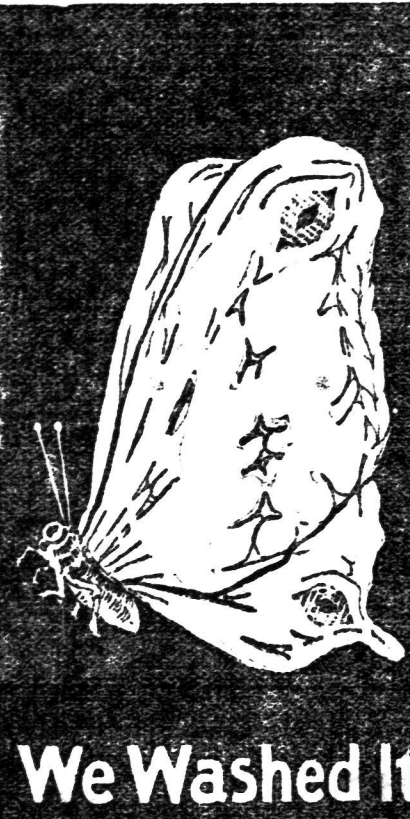

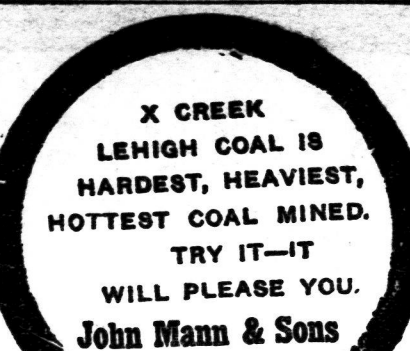

GARAGE APPROACH CAUSING TROUBLE

Board of Works Opened Up a Big Question at Meeting Last Night.

ALDERMEN HAVE TIFF

Ald. Saunders and Ald. Tancock Continue To Make Things Unpleasant For Each Other.

The board of works opened up rather a serious matter last night at their meeting, when they decided to obtain the opinion of the city solicitor on the liability of the city for approaches into certain buildings.

The trouble arose over the application of Mr. R. Hueston for an approach into his garage on Richmond street. There is quite a drop from his premises to the roadway, and in order to permit an entrance the walk has to be sloped somewhat toward the road.

There is a possibility of a person slipping down this slight incline, but no trouble has ever occurred in the city.

Mr. Hueston made an application of this entrance, and on the recommendation of City Engineer Graydon, the work was allowed to go on. Ald. Tancock, however, did not approve of the entrance, and last night stated the objections.

Solicitor's Opinion.

"I want the city solicitor's opinion on this," said Ald. Tancock. "You must consider that this might be dangerous to the public, and if we are liable we should have the place closed up."

"You are opening up a question that will cause us no end of trouble," said Mayor Beattie. "There is only one opinion that Mr. Meredith will give us, and that is that we are liable. However, it is one of these things that had better be winked at. It would be folly to advertise our liability, and that is apparently the intention. No person has been injured, and no damage has been done by this. There are scores of such entrances throughout the city, and nobody finds fault. I can see no necessity of getting Mr. Meredith's opinion."

A Personal Whim.

"You asked the solicitor's opinion on something a while ago, and I cannot see why I cannot have his opinion if I want it," said Ald. Tancock.

"You want to gratify your personal whim, that's all," said Ald. Saunders. "I do not know that we have any right to pay the citizens' money to gratify your humors. We are liable, anybody knows that, but we are giving citizens a chance to do business, and that is something. We are going along all right now, and there is no need to open the question."

Ald. Morgan thought it would be worth while knowing how far the council could go, and moved to that effect.

"Stay with me in this," Ald. Tancock asked the committee, and Ald. Morgan and Ald. Pocock supported the motion. Ald. Saunders, it and Mayor Beattie opposed, so it was up to Ald. Tancock to vote for the information required.

"You are good," shot back Ald. Saunders. "You never make an opportunity to vote for yourself."

There will be scores of entrances closed up if Ald. Tancock succeeds in closing that to Hueston's.

COLDSTREAM PATIENTS ARE DOING VERY WELL

Dominion Govt. Is Apparently Determined to Run Down Perpetrators.

Lucan, March 24.—A special Dominion Government detective has arrived here, and is investigating the robbery of the rural mail boxes, which took place last fall. No trace of the perpetrators was found at the time, notwithstanding an investigation which followed. The matter, however, is being taken up again by another detective, who arrived here from Ottawa yesterday, and it is expected that some arrests will be made shortly.

Owen Sound, March 23.—A barn on the farm of Adam Brown was totally destroyed by fire last night, and the loss is estimated at over \$5,000. It was one of the largest, best-equipped buildings of its kind in this section, and a large part of last season's crop and most of the live stock and vehicles were destroyed.
