

WESLEY SCOTT WON HIS CASE CARRIED APPEAL TO TORONTO

Decision in Scott Vs. Vining, a Sequel to a Famous Trial, Was
Reversed--The Executors Will Now Carry the
Case to a Higher Court.

A few years later Wesley was married, and while he always took his meals at the home of Harvey Scott, he and his family resided in a small building on the Scott homestead. There was never the best of feeling existing between the families, it is alleged, and after frequent squabbles Harvey Scott was shot by Mrs. Wesley Scott on her doorstep after a quarrel over a dog in August, 1908.

Wesley's Courtship
When Wesley first read it, it was found that the deceased had bequeathed his realty to a nephew, Arthur Scott, ignoring the alleged contract with Wesley. The latter then contracted for damages and wages for several years as an alternative. In the courts he produced records kept by his father of the cost of maintaining Wesley, and of the salary paid to his son when he was a boy, although he was sent away during his lifetime, and when he was absent for a few hours on any day, he was docked at the rate of one dollar per day, while his wages were reckoned at about \$100 per year. Such a man, who was worth of salt, two cents for a sheet of paper, and the like, was also depicted by the old gentle-

The Case. Wesley Scott, the plaintiff, who now resides on Midland street, with his family, alleges that in 1885, while still unmarried, he made a contract with his father to remain on the Scott farm, near Thorndale, and work the land till the death of his father, when he was to receive the property. In the event of either breaking this agreement, the other was to be entitled to damages.

FOREIGN MISSIONS UNTOUCHED BY REBELS

Tung Province Still Very Grave.

Hong Kong, May 2.—Advisers received today state that the anti-Manchu movement has spread in the Wes River District through Kwang Tung Province and to Amoy in the south.

Service on the Canton-Kowloon section of the railway to Hong Kong has been abandoned, and the British railway officials have been obliged to come to this city.

It is difficult to obtain reliable news of the presence of the rebels, but the dispatches received are grave. Details of the fighting at Canton came early today.

The bodies of the soldiers killed have been removed. A son of the viceroy of Canton and a maid were found hidden under a bed in the servants' quarters of the palace, which escaped the destruction when the home was set on fire.

The commander of a cruiser was killed. Admiral Li Wo, commander of the royal troops, in the first two days of the fighting, is said to have personally killed ten revolutionaries.
