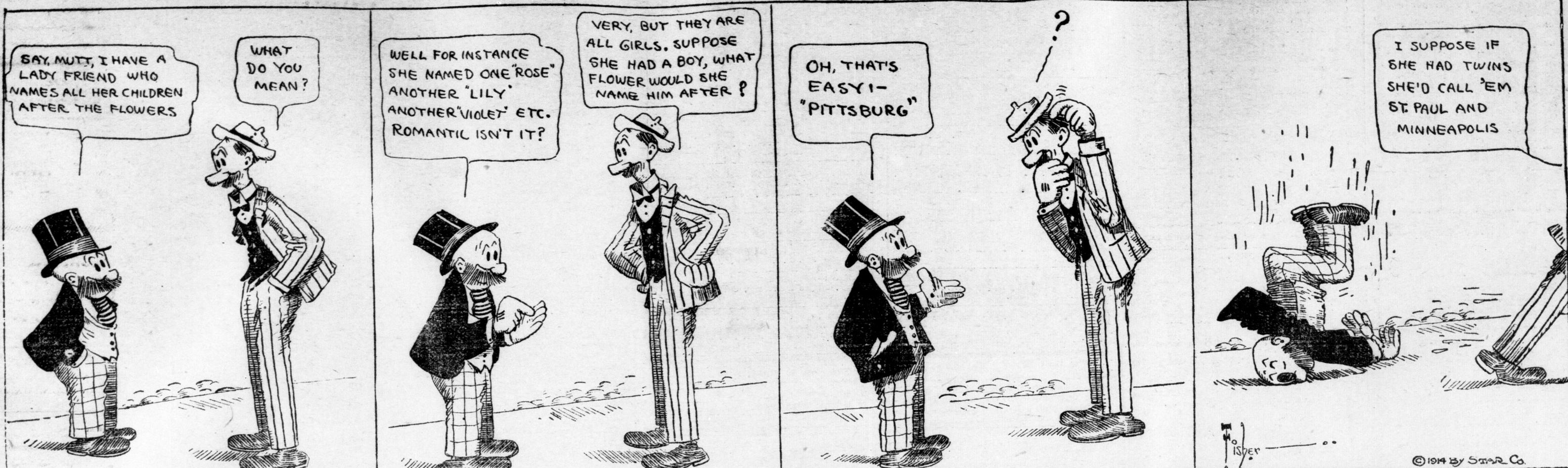

Spirited racing, bang-up finishes and a record crowd were the predominating features yesterday afternoon that brought to a close the most successful four-day meet the London Turf Association has ever held on the Queen's Park race track.

Monarchial Lady, who carried a ton of money and was a 3 to 10 favorite in every heat of the 218 trot, after blowing up in the first two, came back strong in the three final heats, winning them and the \$1,000 purse. The time set in this race was fast, the field making the winner step the distance in 2:14. Jay Worthing, with Ray up, looked like the dangerous horse, but when he had the third heat of this race was the best of the event. Jay followed at his heels, broke, and Monarchial Lady jumped to first position, with Magette fighting to beat her out. These two raced around the track, but the latter tired, and the former won by inches.

Nat Ray, driving his own horse, Plato, repeated his Thursday performance, and in a come-back stunt won three straight heats of the 215 pace. Pedro was the only best in the race to give Plato a battle, and he failed in stretch-racing. The Moose showed a burst of speed that brought the fans to their feet, but it was short-lived, and the best he could do was to win by a head. Worthing, driven by Smith, won the tail end of the purse, running fourth.

Coming to the few entrants in the running race, the judges decided to call off this event.
