

NEW YORK DAILIES APPLAUD U. S. NOTE TO PRES. CARRANZA

Note Patient but Determined,
Is the World's Opinion.

FULL REPLY, SAYS TIMES

Herald Says Wilson Is En-
titled to Full Support
of Nation.

New York, June 21.—Editorial comment on the American note to Mexico in newspapers of New York City credit it with strength and courage. Excerpts from the principal newspapers follow:
The World—"The American note to Mexico is the utterance of a nation that would be understood as a friend. Carranza's capital, it is courteous, and, in still greater contrast, it suggests patience and determination rather than anger and defiance."
It excuses for hostilities were needed on our part, they could be found in abundance in the long list of grievances which Secretary Lansing presents. Only by self-restraint, by humane consideration, and by benevolent purpose, adhered to under difficulties, not least of which has been the shocking lack of appreciation of those who have profited by American policy, has an appeal to force been prevented.

On Solid Ground.
The Tribune—"The chief merit of Secretary Lansing's latest note to the Carranza Government is that it at last gets the Administration's policy of intervention in Mexico plainly on solid ground. It puts behind us—let us hope for good and all—the misapprehensions and delusions which have so grievously hampered our Mexican diplomacy in the last three years."
Secretary Lansing is to be congratulated on his latest Mexican note, with its clear and accurate statement of the facts of the position of our Government and people. The note is perhaps over-embellished as a document in so far as it is intended to justify the past course of Mr. Wilson in Mexico. But it interprets correctly the present spirit of the nation here confronting a serious situation. The country, without regard to party, is behind the Administration that attacks this stern notification, and unless Gen. Carranza and his advisers are crazy they will heed the timely warning.

KELLY OBJECTS TO CROWN'S EVIDENCE; MAKES A STATEMENT

Wants to Reserve His Rights
in Possibility of New
Trial.

Winnipeg, June 21.—At the resumption of his trial this morning before Mr. Justice Prud'homme and a jury, Thomas Kelly read a brief statement recording the formal objections with which, it is understood, he desires to reserve his rights in any possible future motion for a new trial. The judge made note of the objections.

Kelly said he wished to record his "objection to the admission of all evidence under the particular facts, and particularly any evidence relating to conspiracy; and to all leading questions; and to all other inadmissible evidence."

He objected to the reception of "evidence of conversation, correspondence or documents, with persons other than myself or to which I am a party." He wished these objections noted generally and given the same effect as if taken to each question and answer.

V. W. Horwood, former provincial solicitor, then resumed his evidence, which it is expected will be concluded by noon today.

BIG MILITARY FIELD DAY BEING HELD AT QUEEN'S PARK

Athletes From Overseas Units Now Training Here Striving

The talent among the soldiers and the athletic prowess of many of the boys in khaki provided a sport card that would be hard to surpass anywhere.

This morning officers at headquarters announced that the sports would be "run off-rain or shine."

This announcement meant that the greatest athletic exhibition ever run in London is being carried out this afternoon as originally planned. This is the first time the morning brought with it considerable anxiety among those who wanted to see the khaki-clad athletes at play, but the officers' announcement cheered them up. The weatherman, too, took a somewhat belated hand in the proceedings, and the best little amateur weather prophets of the city predicted a clear afternoon.

With 225 and more entries in for the various events the afternoon is a busy one. Every available section of Queen's Park track and ring is in use to accommodate the athletes.

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

DECIDED DROP RECORDED
IN THE PRICE OF WHEAT

Minimum Down From 95c to 85c on Market Today.

There was a decided drop in wheat on the local market today, prices being quoted at from 85c to 95c per bushel, and at 1.12 to 1.13 per hundred weight. Last week the quotations were 95c to 1.01 per bushel. This sudden drop was caused by the falling off of wheat in the Chicago and New York markets. Very little wheat has been brought into the local market during the past few days.

Less than half a dozen loads of hay composed the offering on the local market today, the bad weather keeping the farmers from coming into the city. The demand for hay is slow. On Tuesday late in the morning a large number of loads of hay came in, but on the one day. The demand was so weak that prices fell rapidly, and hay was offered as low as \$11 and \$12 per ton for fair quality loads, the best lots getting no higher than \$13 and \$14 per ton.

Today the demand was no better, and the few loads which were in were offered cheap, at from \$17 to \$19 per ton.

The local market has been flooded with hay during the week and the demand has been filled. Dealers are of opinion that further hay into the city for a few days until the supply is exhausted when the demand will again be brisk.
