DR. G. E. JARVIS WAS
ELECTED PRESIDENT

The Canadian Institute of Homeo-
pathy, which was organized nearly
fifty years ago in this city, met this
week in Hamilton. Drs. C. T. Camp-
bell and C. E. Jarvis attended from
London. During the sessions infantile
paralysis was discussed. The mem-
bers expressed the same confidence in
its successful treatment as in other
epidemic ailments. Dr. Hinsdale, dean
of Homeopathic College, Ann Arbor,
while delivering an address on the
"Status of Homeopathic Institutions
Throughout the World" informed the
institute that one of their professors
was at present in New York conducting
an investigation as to the comparative
results of treatment with and without
homeopathic medicines. His report
will be available about November
next.

The officers elected for the ensuing

re-elected; vice-president, Dr. Mc-
Laren, Ottawa; secretary-treasurer,
Dr. McFarren, Toronto. These officers
constituted the executive and the

BALANCE OF \$400
AFTER CELEBRATION
HELD ON LABOR DAY

Trades Council Is Well Pleased
With Work Done.

PROTEST RE TUG-OF-WAR
McClary Team Claims It
Won the Cup by
Default.

At the meeting of the trades and
labor council last evening reports were
submitted by the different committees,
showing that total receipts of the Labor
Day celebration were \$564.32.
About \$150 will be required for ex-
penses, leaving a balance of over \$400
cleared from the picnic.

Financially, the celebration was the
best in years, and the members of the
council are pleased as a result.

Of the amount paid out \$75 was ex-
pended for music for the day.

Argument Over Cup.
A long discussion in which practical-
ly everyone present had something to
say, arose over the cup awarded the
lightweight tug-of-war team from the
G. T. R. machine shop.

McClary's team, captained by F. Mc-
Phail, sent a letter of protest claim-
ing that the cup should go to their
team by default because they claimed
the G. T. R. team had failed to enter
their team before August 23.

Explanations were made by several
of the members that the time had
been extended until Labor Day be-
cause no entries had been made be-
fore.

Arguments continued to arise on the
question until it seemed there would
be an all night session.

President Hessel cut the dis-
cussion short by saying that surely
the trades and labor council had more
important matters to discuss, if not,
they better quit and go home.

Left to Committee.
A motion was then made to leave
the matter to the committee to deal
with at its Monday night meeting.

Delegate Masters from the cigar-
makers' union, reported progress in the
strike, and further stated that it was
expected everything would be cleared
up within a few days.

Letters from William Gray, M. P.,
Frank Glass, M. P., and T. W. Croth-
ers, M. P., giving information concern-
ing the labor law and the impor-
tation of foreign labor, were read.

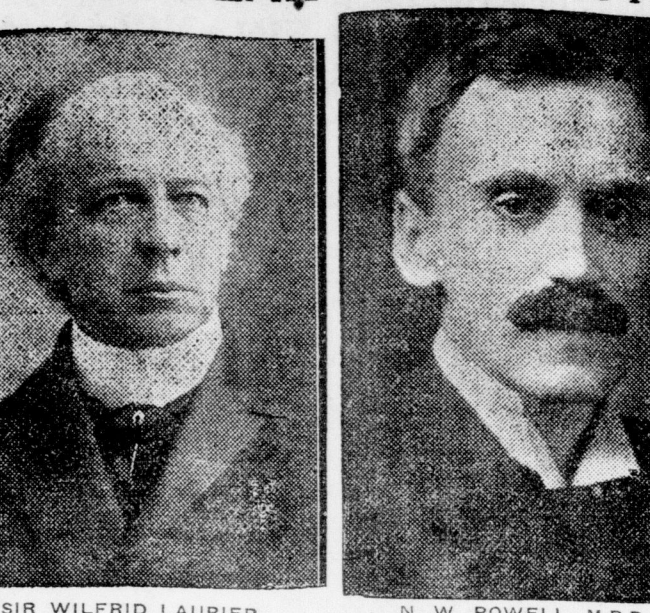
A vote of thanks was passed by the
council for the information, and letters
to that effect will be sent to the mem-
bers at Ottawa.

Urges Air Brakes.
Delegate Buchanan suggested that a
resolution be adopted by the council
urging that the London street railway
be compelled to install air brakes on
all street cars, or procure new cars
so equipped.

He made the suggestion in view of
the number of accidents that he
claimed could be prevented were air
brakes used. He referred to the recent
collision at the corner of William and
Dundas streets as an example.

Another suggestion was made by
delegate Buchanan that the council
should urge that the London street
railway be compelled to install air
brakes on all street cars, or procure
new cars so equipped.

WILL SPEAK IN THIS CITY

LAURIER, NORRIS AND ROWELL
TO SPEAK IN THIS CITY AT
LIBERAL CLUB CONVENTION

Federal, Manitoba and Ontario Party Leaders Will Be Here
On September 27 for Rally at Hyman Hall and a
Banquet at Winter Garden.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier Norris
of Manitoba, and Mr. N. W. Rowell,
K.C., M.P.P., leader of the Ontario
Opposition, are all to speak at a Lib-
eral meeting in London on the evening
of September 27. This will be not only
the largest political gathering in Lon-
don in many years, if not in its his-
tory, but it will also be perhaps the
most important in Canada in the last
decade.

Sir Wilfrid is expected to make a
pronouncement of a history-making
nature, and all Canada will await with
interest what he will have to say on
this occasion.

Mr. Rowell Back From Europe.
Mr. Rowell will make his first public
appearance after his return from
Europe, where he has been making a
special study of conditions, with a
view to many phases of social reform
that will face the people of Canada
after the war. His speech will be of
additional interest since it will be his
first public utterance after the three
Government-smashing by-elections.

The prime minister of Manitoba is
not so familiar to the people of On-
tario, but he is a man who has been
keenly interested in the man who led
the popular revolt against Manitoba
graft. His progressive legislation has
placed him in the public eye, and
both he and Mr. Rowell may make de-
clarations of policy that will add to
the very great importance of this
gathering.

Convention of Liberal Clubs.
The occasion of the bringing together
of these eminent Canadians at one
meeting in London is the annual con-
vention of the Ontario Federation of
Liberal Clubs, which for the first time
is meeting outside the city of Toronto.

The business meeting of the delegates
will be held in the afternoon at Hyman
Hall, which, it is expected, will be
taxed to its capacity. It is usual to
conclude the meeting with a banquet,
and when the convention has been
held in Toronto the attendance
at the banquet has been limited to the
capacity of the Ontario Club.

Function at Winter Garden.
In London the intention is to provide
accommodation to as many others, not
members of Liberal clubs, as possible,
and to this end the London Liberal
Club has secured the Princess Winter
Garden, where upwards of 700 may be
languished.

The invitation to the Ontario Fed-
eration was extended at the last annual
meeting in Toronto, and the executive,
which is composed of members in var-
ious parts of Ontario, have been co-
operating with the London Liberal Club
in making the arrangements for this
meeting and banquet. They will be
sided over by President Conant of
Ottawa, and the list of speakers will
include the Dominion candidate of the
London Liberals, Mr. George S. Gib-
bons, and other prominent Ontario
men.

Large Attendance Expected.
Committees have been at work for
some time in making arrangements for
the banquet and the function at Win-
ter Garden.

GOOD SPEED EVENTS
AT INGERSOLL FAIR

Arrangements for Two-Day Event Are
Completed.

Limit Horse-Tying.
A resolution was passed by the coun-
cil, at which three of the members
were absent, instructing the town
clerk to prepare a by-law to amend the
traffic by-law by limiting the tying of
horses to ten minutes. It is suggested
that the merchants provide weights
to which the horses are to be tied.

CLASS OF "MODELITES"
LARGEST IN YEARS

Clinton School Has Thirty In Atten-
dance—Total Scholars Over 300.

CLINTON, Sept. 6.—Clinton schools
set off to a good start yesterday, the
collegiate institute opening with an at-
tendance of about two hundred, and
six teachers in charge.

The model school started with an
attendance of over three hundred, and
the class of modelites has grown until
it has now reached thirty, which is
the largest for some years.

LOCAL DRUGGISTS WANT DISPENSARY TO HANDLE LIQUOR

Telegram Sent to Hon. W. J.
Hanna After Conference.

PROTESTS POURING IN
Too Many Restrictions and
Regulations in New
Act.

A lettergram was sent to Hon. W. J.
Hanna, provincial secretary, by the
Retail Druggists' Association of the
city last night, asking that certain
clauses of the temperance act as it
pertains to druggists, be made more ex-
plicit in its reading.

The questions that the provincial sec-
retary will be asked to answer are
those relative to the sale of alcohol as
used in "home or family prescriptions,"
and other technical points on which
the druggists are not quite clear.

The lettergram was sent as a result
of a conference of the city druggists
yesterday afternoon, when the new act
was discussed from every angle.

The consensus of opinion seemed to
be that the druggists did not want to
handle liquor under any consideration,
and would be well pleased to have the
traffic handled entirely by a Govern-
ment dispensary.

The Government dispensary idea,
they believed, would eliminate to a
great extent the difficulties that they
maintain are bound to arise under the
new act.

They also protest against the added
restrictions, and believe that the Gov-
ernment should assume the responsi-
bility of handling the liquor and not
put it on the shoulders of the druggists.

It is believed that the Ontario Gov-
ernment will make certain concessions
yet that will facilitate matters as far
as the druggists are concerned.

Protests Pour In.
Protests are being sent in by drug-
gists all over the province asking that
certain sections of the act be mod-
ified.

One section particularly to which the
druggists object is that clause which
makes it necessary to account for every
ounce.

The matter of accounting for every
ounce, they claim, is beyond their
power, because wastage and evapora-
tion alone are two factors to take into
consideration that would mean ounces
lost, for which they could not account.

The filling of "family recipes" par-
ticularly those that call for bay rum,
etc., is a question that they claim that
is not placed before them in a reason-
able light, and they ask an amend-
ment to this section.

A reply from the provincial secretary
is expected today.
