ARREST CITY DENTIST ON CHARGE OF PERJURY AT M'MULLEN TRIAL FOR ROBBING BANK AT WYOMING

Sarnia, Oct. 19.—James Allen Milne, residing at 1260 King street, London, and practicing as a dentist on Dundas street, is charged with perjury at Sarnia on June 15 last during the trial of Edward McMullen, the notorious Wyoming bank bandit, according to a statement by Crown Attorney F. W. Wilson this morning. Milne was arrested in London by Provincial Constable Leslie Atkins and brought to Sarnia yesterday afternoon for bail applica-

ton court, has produced one sensation after another, and the arrest of Milne indicates that at least one other interesting development remains after the dispatch of the actual robbers to jail at Kingston. Not Considering Action.

Crown Attorney Wilson stated this morning that the crown was not considering any action against Dr. Milne's partner, Dr. Smythe, who although he gave evidence in the trial of McMullen, made no statements which are alleged by the crown to be Dr. Milne was the cornerstone of

the defence alibi in the original trial of McMullen, which the bandit escaped for the time being through a jury disagreement. 

DAWSON GLAD TO HAVE PROBE OF JAIL AFFAIRS

Governor Has No Fear of Investigation Mooted by County Residents.

DATA BEING COLLECTED

Request To Be Sent To Raney When Evidence Is Completed.

Officials at the county jail will welcome an investigation if anyone has any charges to make against them or against the management of! that institution, Governor Byron! Dawson declared this morning.

Yesterday the governor refused to discuss the matter at all, stating that under section 29 of the jail regulations, jail officials were unable to say anything for publication regarding matters pertaining to the jail. For a week or more now, county

residents, who claim they will ask for an investigation of charges which have been made to them, have been gathering data on the matter with a view to bringing the matter to the attention of Crown Attorney J. C.

As soon as this data and a request for a probe is brought before the crown attorney, he will forward to Attorney-General W. E. Raney's office and to the department of the inspector of prisons and charities, W. W. Dunlop, he said. County councillors who have been

approached regarding the matter say that there is every reason to believe that an investigation will be asked for at the earliest possible moment. Talk of an investigation first came to the surface last week when Night Turnkey John Burdon and Mrs. Fred Last, matron, handed in their resignations and declared they were unable to hold office under the existing conditions.

Since then a number of prominent county ratepayers have received complaints of the manner in which the iail was managed, and state they are certain they have received sufficient charges which, when laid before the crown will warrant a probe

QUITS OFFICE AS TORY MEMBERS RING DEATH KNELL OF COALITION BY FLOCKING BACK TO PARTY FOLD

Conservative Element in the House Votes to Desert Unionist Administration.

CONFUSION PREVAILS IN BRITISH POLITICAL ARENA

Premier May Form New Party To Win Back Power.

London, Oct. 19.—The Lloyd George coalition received its death blow at the hands of the Conservative party when the Conservative members of the House of Commons and government ministers at their meeting in the Carlton Club today voted 186 to 87 to appeal to the country as the Conservative party. This creates a situation of the greatest political confusion and uncertainty the country has known for many years.

The next move certain to be made will be the resignation of Austen Chamberlain and his associates, Lord Balfour and Lord Birkenhead, from the cabinet. It is expected Premier Lloyd George will then present his resignation to the king and advise his majesty to summon a Conservative leader to form a government. This course would be taken because the Conservatives have the largest number of members in the House of Commons. Will Pick Leader.

British Premier Outlasts All Statesmen of World War

LOYD GEORGE outlasted all the statesmen who guided the great nations through the world war. In the turmoil that followed the conflict, he kept his seat at the steering wheel when all around him were losing theirs.

The three men with whom he sat at Paris as the "big four" of the peace conference, long ago were toppled over. Premier Orlando of Italy was the first to go. His cabinet resigned in June,

The following January, Clemenceau, the French tiger, was cast aside. Two months later. the Senate of the United States refused for a second time to ratify the peace treaty Woodrow Wilson had brought home from Versailles, and not long afterwards his party was beaten at the polls.

After all the other three had been put aside in their countries, Lloyd George became probably the most outstanding figure among all the men of the world who were engaged in public affairs. The rise of Lloyd George was an adventure, in politics filled with much romance. He was born in Manchester,

England, January 17, 1863. His father, a Unitarian schoolmaster, died when David was an infant and the child was adopted by an uncle, Richard Lloyd, a Welsh shoemaker and lay preacher. With only a limited education, David went into a law office in the little town in north Wales, where he lived with his uncle Then he married and soon dived into politics.

entire cabinet. London, Oct. 19 .- When Mr. Lloyd George tendered his resignation to the King this morning. he advised His Majesty to summon Andrew Bonar Law, the Conservative leader, to form a new cabinet. Up until 6 o'clck this morning Mr. Bonar Law had not been to Buckingham Palace.

London, Oct. 19 .- (Associated Press).—The government of Premier Lloyd George resigned this afternoon.

The announcement of the government's resignation was made by the Central News. Up to 4:23 o'clock this afternoon no official or other announcement of it had appeared, but it had been preceded by the semi-official announcement of the Press Association stating it had learned on high authority that the govern-

ment would resign forthwith. After a brief audience with King George this afternoon Mr. Lloyd George returned to Downing street, where he received a miners' delegation. According to Frank Hodge, who headed the delegation, Mr. Lloyd George said he could not consult them as prime minister since he had resigned. Fourth International Council Consider Move to Increase Size of Organization.

Geneva, Oct. 19 .- The draft of the amended article 393 of the peace treaty was presented at the opening session of the fourth international labor conference here yesterday. It provides that the international labor office shall be composed of thirtytwo members, instead of twenty-four, as in the original article, of whom sixteen, instead of tweive, shall represent the governments, eight the employers and eight the workers.

Of the sixteen government members six are to be appointed, one each by the governments of the United States, Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan and Germany. The ten other members representing the governments will be elected by a majority of all the governmental delegates present at the conference; four of these ten will be from non-European
