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VETERAN CITIZEN DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

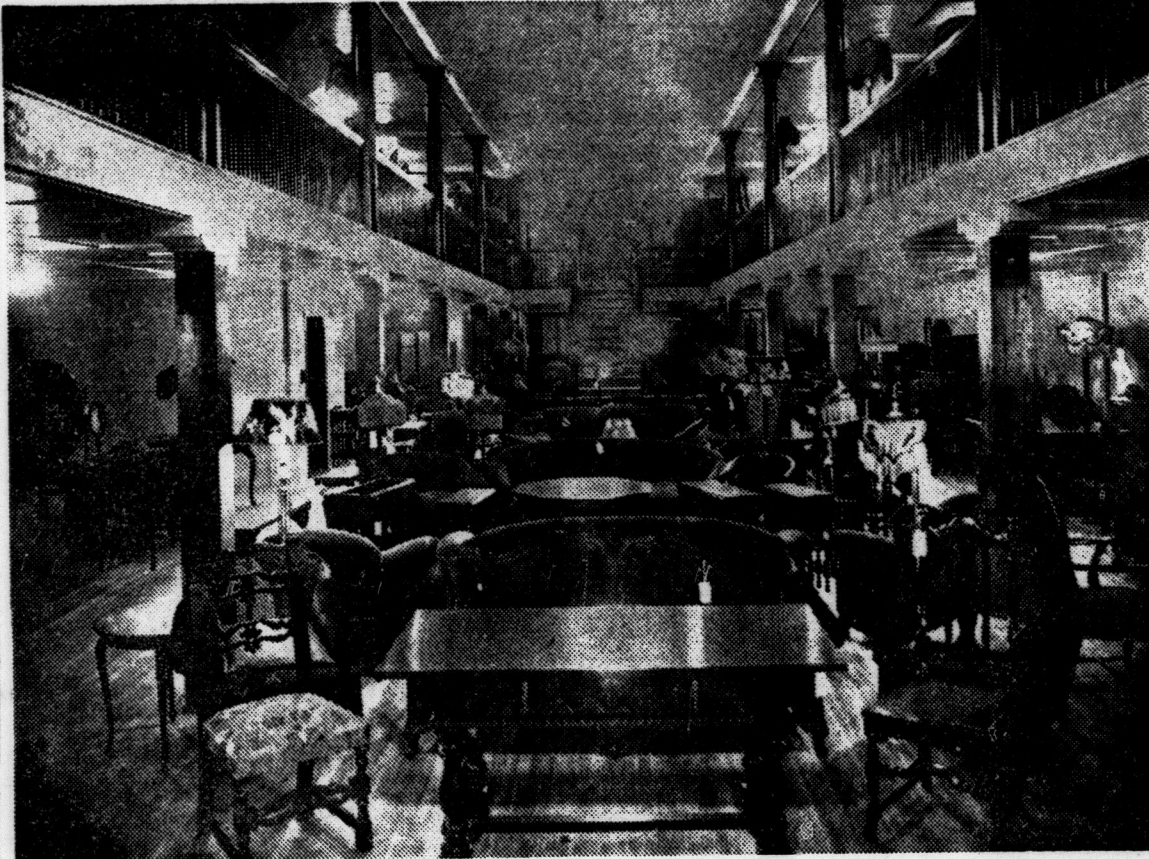
John Connor Succumbs to His

DEBT OF CANADA IS CUT MORE THAN 16 MILLION

Ordinary Revenue Increases by Nearly Three Million During
First Four Months of Year, While Expenditures Are Cut
by \$890,849 During Same Period.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 7.—Canada's ordinary revenue for the four months of the present fiscal year ended on July 31 last shows an increase of \$2,932,163 over the same four-month period last year, according to the books of the Department of Finance. Ordinary revenue for the four months of 1925 which have elapsed amounted to \$141,739,416. For the same four months of 1924, the amount was \$138,807,252.

The final statement issued today shows a decrease in ordinary expenditure for the four-month period of \$890,849. Ordinary expenditures for that part of the fiscal year which had elapsed on July 31 amounted to \$95,655,692. The monthly figures, however, show an increase in ordinary expenditures last month as compared with July, 1924, of \$2,126,299.

The total net debt of Canada on July 31 of the present year stood at \$2,375,249,305. This is a decrease from the net debt on the same day a year ago of \$16,292,375.

Saskatoon, Sask., Aug. 7.—Sweeping down upon Saskatoon and the immediately adjacent farming districts with relentless fury, hail, hurled from the west on the crest of a fierce gale, caused considerable damage in the Grandforks, Dufferin and Vanscoy districts, Thursday. The storm only lasted 15 minutes. It struck a Canadian National freight train and tore the roofs from three cattle cars.

Pretender To French Throne Longs To See Homeland Again.

London, Aug. 7.—Louis Philippe, Duke of Orleans, who has lived in exile in England for forty years, has made an impassioned plea for permission to return to France to spend his declining years.

English comment says he will have to renounce his claims to the French throne before he will be permitted to return, and this he is understood to be unwilling to do.

The Duke left England for Belgium last week in order to be near the motherland in case his appeal was granted, and his four decades of suffering in exile ended.

His appeal, addressed to the Duc de Lynces, and reprinted in the London papers today, is couched in moving terms. It protests against eternal exile, concluding: "One must feel this agony to understand the heart-breaking effect of it. I, who have longed so much to serve France, have been denied this joy and honor for forty years. I have remained in banishment. God grant that I may see France again before I die."

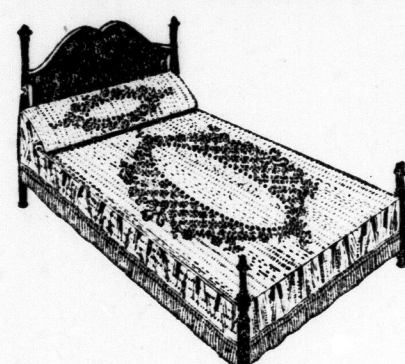
