

ANSWER TO CORRESPONDENTS, Atmospheric Resistance - Fact vs.

William Buchanan, superintendent of motive power of the New York Central. says that the enormous speed developed by the famous "999" has completely shattered all the previous theories of the atmospheric resistance necessary to be overcome before increased speed would be attainable.

"Some two or three years ago," said Mr. Buchanan, "Mr. Forncy wrote an article for Scribner's in which he tried to argue how it was impossible to obtain a speed of a hundred miles an hour. He previded figures and theories, but neither were correct, as has been demonstrated by No. 999. If the resistance were what he figured it to be, the force would be enough to blow in the glass on the front of the cab. But it has been demonstrated that the resistance does not increase in proportion to the speed. My own theory is that the eddies of air and wind as given off from the corners and crevices of the loco-motive in its rush aid in resisting the pres-

sure. Moreover, it does not require the

effort, for as the momentum increases the

resistance decreases. Take for example,
