The Financier says:—The statement of the associated banks of New York for the week ending October 29 shows another rotable increase in the various items. Loans reflect a gain of \$10,221,300, making the total expansion for the month of October almost \$32,000,000. The increase in cash for the week was \$6,634,500, made up principally of specie receipts. The gain in cash and the loan expansion account for the increase of \$15,781,100 in deposits. The heavier deposits of course raised the reserve requirement, but not enough to offset the cash gain. In consequence, the surplus reserve of the banks is \$2,679,225 higher than for the previous week, and stands at \$26,091,560, or nearly \$22,000,000 more than reported on September 17 last. The changes that have occurred within the past 30 days are well shown in the deposit item, which in the time named have represented area. \$50,000,000. the deposit item, which in the time named has increased over \$59,000,000. Naturally, has increased over \$59,000,000. Naturally, these conditions reflect the completion of the bond transaction, and the effect of Government deposits and gold imports.
