### GERMAN TARIFF. Comment by the Press on the Increase of Duties.

Berlin, July 27.—All the morning papers devote much space to the tariff bill. The majority of the Conservative papers give the provisions of the bill with little discussion thereof the tone of which is, however, that the duties have only been moderately increased so much so as to agriculturalists need, but that Count von Bulow the imperial chancellor, did his best.
