AMAZING WORK OF RAILWAY TROOPS

Connected British and French System During Recent Retirement.

Ottawa, May 11.—The following article by Roland Hill has been received here:

One company of Canadian Railway Troops, of a York county, Ontario Battalion, had amazing adventures during the British retirement. They were building lines at the extreme eastern limit of the British section, and for days and nights they worked feverishly to connect up with a French system, so that the valuable French stock could be hauled away. At one place they made a record of over nine miles constructed in one day, under heavy shelling from the enemy. By making the connection, 27 locomotives and 235 trucks were run out of the danger zone.

Salved Valuable Material.

Their wanderings from Chancery took them to Noyon and thence to Apple Court, where a large was obtained from the French, and their equipment loaded on that and sent down the canal to safety. At Longueuil they came across a huge French engineering dump where the Allies were trying to save. They offered their services and set to work in real fashion. There is a great shortage of horses, but plenty of huge timbers. The railwaymen boomed the canal and dumped the lumber, making long slim rafts that would just fit the locks.

Twenty thousand feet of lumber was salvaged in this way, but that was not enough. They loaded steel rails and other engineering material on the improvised rafts and, under the guidance of some French-Canadian lumbermen, who belonged to the battalion, started their adventurous, but completely successful journey down the canal. Lower down another huge timber dump of fifty thousand feet and several thousand poles and wooden ties were salvaged the same way. Arrived safely at Compiegne with their miscellaneous freight, they built a huge skidway and safely received all the lumber and other things, then started north and joined their battalion.

Lusitania when she was torpedoed three years ago today, has sent the following message to the national war saving committee:

"To-day is the third anniversary of the sinking of the Lusitania. Many events and emotions have come upon us since then. One's memory is laden with incidents that have stirred the surprise and anger of the civilized world.

"I still keep in memory the tragedy of the Lusitania, a tragedy enacted by an Emperor and a people who flung to the winds all restraint of honor and chivalry. The Kaiser will be known in time to be the Herod of the twentieth century, who caused Rachel to weep for her children.

"Worse even than the sinking of the vessel was the sinister way in which it was planned and the shouts of exultation that afterwards went through Germany. A medal was struck—a medal in commemoration of a crime! To rejoice in doing evil is surely the depth of degradation.

"The sinking of the Lusitania made the world see plainly the inherent criminality of its foe. On the brow of Prussia was the mark of the beast.

"You will recall your first emotions with the news of the sinking of the Lusitania. Germany has not changed since. Let us not relax our efforts until we have destroyed the evil spirits who planned and rejoice in such a crime."
