EDITOR'S MAIL
Editor of The Graphic,
Dear Sir:-
I wish to call the attention
of the Dalhousie street committee
to a very important matter—
there is no doubt but the wish of
the builder of those sidewalks is that
they should be as permanent as weath-
er and soil conditions would permit.
I see in many places that the water
is allowed to run over at least to cover
part of the sidewalk making an un-
pleasant appearance and sure to dam-
age the work.

Some may say the sidewalk is too
low—well the walk was made to suit
height of the buildings and when put
down was at least six inches higher
than any surface adjoining the walks.
This has been going on for several
years—and any man who has care of
the streets should see that all mate-
rial is kept cleared away to a proper
and reasonable level.

Another matter I will mention—
I was passing a certain man's store in
the spring—he had a boy cutting ice
off the sidewalk in front of the store—
that boy had an axe and was swinging
into it with all his might. I looked
for the proprietor but couldn't find
him—but his easy to find the axe
marks.

I have been observing all this and
hoped that before the frost came
this would be attended to and help
save a valuable piece of Town prop-
erty.
