

OPENING BANQUET OF COMMERCIAL TRAVELLER'S ASSOCIATION HELD HERE

Large Gathering Attended Function At Chateau Restigouche Saturday Evening—Program Featured By Many Interesting Speeches And Good Musical Selections—Most Enjoyable Occasion For all Present.

An enthusiastic gathering and an interesting programme which was evidently much enjoyed by all those attending, were pleasing features of the Opening Banquet of the Campbellton Commercial Travellers Association held in the Chateau Restigouche on Saturday night. Some twenty-five members attended the function and in addition to this number several local merchants and visiting travellers also gathered about the banquet table.

The supper march was played shortly after nine o'clock and a few minutes later nearly every place about the long banquet table was occupied. Mr. Duval C. Firth, who is the oldest and most commercial traveller in the province and who was made an Honorary Member of the Association at a special meeting that afternoon, presided and welcomed the guests. After this supper went forward without delay and all devoted themselves to having a good time.

The long banquet table presented a most pleasing appearance and in this connection every detail was thoughtfully arranged for by the management of the hotel. All guests had just finished the first course when the following programme was read: The menu follows: Olives, Cream of Chicken, Roast Chicken with Dressing, Creamed Carrots, Green Peas, Apple Scallop with Whipped Cream, The Pie, Ice Cream, Milk, Cakes, and Olives.

The evening's programme of toasts and speeches interspersed with songs and musical selections was unattended by a single dull moment. Song sheets were thoughtfully provided by Messrs. Ferguson and Wallace and at times the whole gathering united in a chorus which reverberated throughout the building.
