COURT-HOUSE OR NO COURT-HOUSE.

There seems a probability now that a new ourt house may be a thing of the near future. Warden Jackson in his opening address to the county council yesterday, declared himself strongly in favor of the work being commenced as soon as possible. The members of the county council, however, are trying to make out that it is the fault of the city that the new buildings have not been erected long ago. But there is another side to the question, and it would appear that the county has hit upon a very ingenious method of providing its share of the building fund. The proceeds of the sale of the old jail property in Berkeley street—some \$20,000—still remains untouched by the county. The present court house building in Adelaide street is the sole property of the county, although the city pays two-thirds of its maintenance. The county is now willing to dispose of this property, which is probably worth \$70,000. With the latter sum and the \$20,000 from the sale of the old jail it worth \$70,000. With the latter sum and the \$20,000 from the sale of the old jail it would be easily enabled to contribute its share to the new building without spending a cent. The county is only in favor of erecting a building to cost from \$200,000 to \$250,000. This was manifested in the clause of the grand jury's presentment to Chief Justice Wilson on Tuesday.
