DISASTROUS FIRE ON LONDON EX-HIBITION GROUNDS

The exhibition was not set down on the official program, and although it involved an extra expenditure of \$10,000 it went through without a hitch. Be fore the spark from the electric wire which started the blaze was extin-guished the whole of the carriage building, the poultry shed and the W.C.T.U. building, besides several smaller erections, were in smoking

The formal opening of the Fair was set for Friday, and all day to-day people flocked to the grounds, and exhibits were being put in place.

Just then a wave of fire flew in the back windows and the ladies and their friends scrambled incontinently out the front.
