

PEOPLE TO VOTE ON GUELPH LINE

Choose Operation by Local Commission or Hydro

DEPUTATION SEES BECK

Chairman Promises Co-Operation in Getting Road in Shape

GUELPH, Oct. 28.—The net result of the visit of the deputation from this city to see Premier Drury and Sir Adam Beck is to place the situation with respect to the local street railway in the same position as before the agreement was signed between the hydro commission and the city for the taking over of the railway by the hydro, but which was blocked in its ratification by Premier Drury.

The city officials realize that something must be done as soon as possible. It is proposed to submit a by-law to the people at the next election to secure the authority to raise a sufficient sum of money to go ahead with the work. Before the bonds can be sold, however, special legislation must be secured, but if the people vote favorably it is not expected there will be any opposition from the Government. It is also possible that when the Council submits the by-law to the people it will ask the electors if they would prefer to have the management of the railway handed over to the hydro in order that more expert management may be secured. Much of the difficulty experienced on the road being operated under civil control.

HYDRO READY TO HELP.
Premier Drury sees no objection to this plan, and Sir Adam Beck received the deputation graciously and expressed regret that affairs in connection with the Guelph Radial Railway had turned the turn they had, but the Government had sent its ultimatum on the question and there was nothing to be done for the City of Guelph to do but go ahead and operate its own road. He promised to assist the city in any way within the power of the commission, and told them frankly that they would be heartily co-operating in putting the road in good shape.

WILL OPERATE IF PUTTED.
He advised the city to proceed with the putting of the road in as good shape as possible, and as soon as possible, and pointed out that by charging other roads for running rights over its lines a substantial revenue might be obtained. It would be necessary, however, to put down heavy rails in order to carry the larger cars and to put the overhead construction in proper condition. He advised them not to do any more than was actually necessary because of the high price of materials, and intimated that in a year's time things may be cheaper. He gave the deputation every possible encouragement and even stated that if the ratepayers said so, the hydro commission would operate the line for the city as it already had the power to do this.

NEAR FATALITIES FROM GAS FUMES

Kitchener Family of Eight Were Violently Ill

KITCHENER, Oct. 28.—Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Bolert and family, Church street, had a narrow escape from death by asphyxiation at an early hour this morning through the spreading of furnace gas through the house. All eight persons, who were sleeping at the time, became violently ill. On attempting to rise they fell in a fainting condition. Medical aid was summoned at once, and after a few hours were well on the road to recovery. It was stated by the physician that a short while longer in the gas-laden rooms would have proven fatal.

CLAIM DISCRIMINATION IN DUTY ON MOTOR CARS

Border Dealers Will Ask that United States Car Owners Living in Windsor Be Made to Pay

WINDSOR, Oct. 28.—As a protest against the alleged unfair practice of permitting a few favored residents on this side of the river to keep their American-bought cars here, solely by virtue of the Detroit license tag which they carry, while the rank and file of auto owners here must pay the regular rate of duty if they desire to use their machines on the Canadian side, Windsor automobile dealers are preparing a petition, which will be sent to Ottawa, urging that no discrimination be shown and that all automobiles brought into Canada from across the line be made to pay duty whether owned by Americans or Canadians, so long as they have residence here.

The dealers say they will cite glaring cases of partisanship usually shown to wealthy men with costly cars while owners of the "liver" class are given no such privileges, but must pay duty on their machines if they buy them in Detroit.

MEETING TO DISCUSS HYDRO POWER SHORTAGE

Mr. Sanderson Calls Conference for To-Day in Toronto

GUELPH, Oct. 28.—T. J. Hannigan, of this city, has received a communication from W. K. Sanderson, of St. Thomas, president of the Hydro-Electric Municipal Association, saying that they have issued a call for a meeting on Friday at 1:30 o'clock at the city hall, Toronto, to consider some relief for the present power shortage. Representatives from all the municipalities using hydro power will attend.

GAPS AT GALT.
GALT, Oct. 28.—Galt, like other hydro municipalities, is off the circuit at times for about an hour, to tide over the period for which relief is demanded. While no permanent reduction of the local load has been ordered, to-day's cut was one of 25 per cent.

STRATFORD CUT DOWN.
STRATFORD, Oct. 28.—The Public Utilities Commission this morning discussed the power situation, but there is little that can be done. The present day allowance of the city is 1,260 kilowatts, while to-day, the first of the reduced power plan, there is only 940 available.

SEES WILSON AS GREAT IDEALIST

Rev. Carter Helm Jones, of Philadelphia, at Brantford

ADDRESSES ROTARY CLUB

Principles of the Organization Founded on Christ

BRANTFORD, Oct. 28.—Rev. Carter Helm Jones, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Philadelphia, addressed the Rotary Club at its noonday luncheon to-day, dwelling on Rotarian principles, which, he declared, were founded on Christ.

Referring to the political situation across the border, he declared that one man, a peripatetic politician, was flashing from here to there, while another, a reiterator of painful platitudes, was going around converting old axioms into new truths as it were. Some day the United States would come back to its ideal, and he paid a great tribute to "that lonely man in the White House, that great idealist."

"If that be treason," he said, "make the worst of it." The appeal of President Wilson to "all forward-looking men" was an appeal of the time.

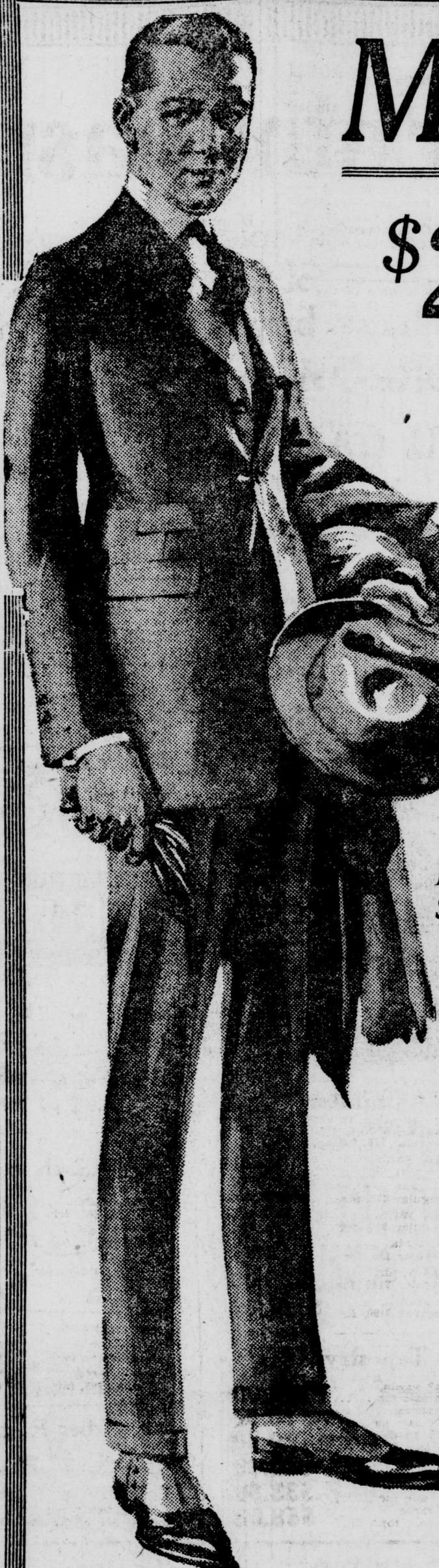
