

DESTRUCTION IN IRELAND ORDERED

Plan To Block and Destroy Roads, Railways Is Discovered

DUBLIN, Nov. 30.—(Associated Press Cable).—Defence Minister Mulcahy has informed the Daily Eireann of a document containing instructions from the Republican "assistant directors of engineering" ordering a "speeding up of all destruction plans," and outlining a scheme for the wholesale blocking of railways, roads and canals.

The plans provide that the stations shall be burned, lines torn up and bridges blown up and wires cut, this campaign to be continued for six weeks, during which it is intended that Dublin shall be isolated. The minister added: "The document continues by giving details regarding the way in which the demolition is to be accomplished," and says: "Trams can be detailed in a number of ways, but care must be taken to avoid loss of life."

EARLY HISTORY OF LONDON UNKNOWN

British Capital Frequent by Traders In A. D. 61.

FIRST DOCK BUILT IN 1800

One Historian Says City Was Founded By Brutus.

LONDON, Nov. 30.—(By Canadian Press).—The origin of the City of London has not been penetrated by the historians. One of the oldest, Geoffrey of Monmouth, ascribed the founding of the city to Brutus, who called it New Troy, but the earliest authentic record is that of Tacitus, who, writing in A. D. 61, described London as a place "copula negotiorum et commutatum maxime celebre"—rendered, liberally, much frequented by a number of merchants and trading vessels."

London's position, 60 miles inland, at the head of navigation of a deep tidal river, gave it commanding advantages as a center of distribution. To the end of the 18th century its trade was carried on either at moorings in the stream, by the aid of barges and lighters, or at wharves constructed on the riverside.

There were no enclosed docks in that period, with warehouses where valuable cargoes might be stored in security. Losses by theft and damage became so serious that public opinion was aroused in the City of London, and a scheme was promoted and the money guaranteed by the leading merchants for constructing enclosed docks. As a result a bill was passed by Parliament in 1799 authorizing the construction of the West India docks, the beginning of the modern dock system as it is to-day. The foundation stone was laid with great ceremony in the presence of Premier Pitt and his Cabinet in 1800, and the docks were completed and opened to shipping in 1802.

So successful was this first venture that what would be called to-day a "boom" in dock-creating enterprise ensued, and further schemes in the hands of private undertakings, which had become impoverished by unwise competition one against the other, and consequently lacked the means to carry out the requirements necessary to keep the port abreast of the times. A state of inaction had existed for nearly 30 years, and this was becoming a menace to London's position as the world's center of commerce. Then a royal commission was appointed to administer the various dock undertakings on the River Thames.

Lloyd George was then president of the board of trade and put through Parliament a Government bill creating the Port of London Authority, 1908, and this came into effect in 1909. The beautiful Port of London Authority administration building, which was formally opened a short time before Lloyd George resigned the premiership, is a monument of which the port authority and the citizens of London generally have reason to be proud. It cost £10,000,000, and is considered to be one of the most beautiful buildings in London.

PLAN FINANCIAL AID FOR FARMERS OF U. S.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—The United States administration had ready to-day a definite program of legislation for the financial relief of farmers, formulated in agreement with Senate leaders of both the agriculture and banking committees and to be pressed with the support at the short session of Congress. The relief plan, designed to reach the small farmers as well as the large cattle raisers and grain growers, proposes an increase in the maximum loan limit of the federal farm banks from \$10,000 to \$25,000, amendment of the farm loan act to provide for the rediscout of agricultural production and marketing paper, with a maximum credit period of three years and a creation of a division in the farm bank system to deal specifically with this class of credits. Provision for the agricultural creation of live stock and agricultural credit associations to deal primarily with live stock loans also is proposed.

TAKE STEPS TO PROTECT LIFE OF THE "TIGER"

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 1.—Georges Clemenceau, former premier of France, who is touring the United States to bring closer Franco-American relations, planned to spend today's afternoon at the home of Joseph Pulitzer, Jr., publisher of The St. Louis Post Dispatch.

To-morrow "the Tiger" is scheduled to deliver his fourth formal address in the United States at the Odéon at 2 o'clock. Chief of Police O'Brien announced that added precautions have been taken to protect Clemenceau during his visit here in view of several threatening letters received at the mayor's office in regard to "the Tiger's" visit.

MR. LEMIEUX HAS AUDIENCE WITH POPE

ROME, Dec. 1.—(Canadian Press Cable).—Hon. Rudolphe Lemieux, Speaker of the Canadian House of Commons, had a private audience with the Pope to-day. His holiness spoke with great affection of Canada and praised the religious spirit of her people. He said that spiritually and materially Canada was the hope of the new world. Her future destiny could not but be bright, illuminated as it was by the heroism, courage and devotion of the early missionaries and pioneers of the country.
