The Manitoba Prohibition Act If the referendum shortly to be submit ted to the electors of Ontario is favorable to prohibition, it is said that the Act will be drafted on the lines of the one propos-ed in Manitoba. The principal features of the Manitoba Act are:—

(1) Abolition of bar, shop and club (2) Prohibition of the sale of liquor ex-

cepting for medicinal and mechanical purposes.
(3) Establishment of licenses for whole-

sale and retail drug stores, permitting them to sell liquor in certain quantities, Wholesale stores—Ten gallons for me-

chanical purposes, such as preservation of human and animal bodies; five gallons to physicians for medicinal purposes.

Retail stores—Sale only on prescription
of physician or to a dentist or veterinary

or a minister of the gospel.

In quantities of one pint to dentists for the treatment of patients, two gallons to vetermaries for treatment of dumb

A physician can carry two quarts with him for use as medicine tor patients. A dentist can give a portion to a pa-

tient.

A minister of the gospel can have in his possession two gallens of wine for sacramental purposes.

Heavy penalties for those who obtain liquor for mechanical purposes and use it for drinking, etc.

Act does not prevent the importation of liquor from each other province.

liquor from any other province or country by a householder or prohibit him having such liquor on his premises.

It does not prevent the manufacture or export of liquor from the province.
