### RURAL LEADERS AT THE O.A.C.

Over one hundred Rural Leaders of Ontario attended the Summer School for Rural Leadership at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph from July 24th to Aug. 4th. It was an inspiring sight to see so many interested in the betterment of conditions in rural homes and communities and willing to give up part of their hard earned holiday to the study of problems of Community Life in Rural Ontario.

The mornings began with a Bible study hour commencing at 7.40 a.m. This was under the splendid leadership of Rev. Prof. McFadyen of Queens' University. From 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. were lectures on "The Rural Home—Some Factors in its Welfare" the lecturers including Prof. R. R. Graham B.A., B.S.A., of the O.A.C., Dr. Gordon Bates, General Secretary of the Canadian National Council for Combating Venereal Diseases; and Miss E. M. Chapman, Assistant Superintendent, Women's Institute Branch Department of Agriculture, Toronto.

From 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. lectures were given on "Community Problems—Organization and Administration." These were under the fine leadership of Alexander Maclaren B.S.A., formerly lecturer in Rural Sociology at the O.A.C., and now Community Organization Secretary of the Social Service Council of Ontario.

At 11 a.m. came visits to the various Departments of the College when the Professors in charge would explain the work of their Department.

The afternoons were given over to recreation and instruction in group games, and the evenings to Lectures and discussions on Community Problems and Work, when such subjects as: "Rural Education; Consolidated Schools; Community Clubs; Work of the Women's Institute; etc., were taken up. Among the lecturers were: President J. B. Reynolds M.A., of the O.A.C., and Miss E. J. Guest, Special Lecturer, Women's Institute Branch, Ontario Department of Agriculture.

A number of resolutions were adopted dealing with Consolidated Schools; Improvement of Rural Schools; Supervision of playgrounds; etc.

President J. B. Reynolds M.A., of the O.A.C., will have charge of the School for next year, and the following were elected to serve on the Advisory Committee of the School to assist the President in planning the programme for 1923: Rev. H. Cotton of Copetown; Rev. S. Woods of Morrison; Rev. T. DeCourcy Rayner of Watford; Rev. T. B. Holland of Norwich, and Miss Hopkins.

### LIQUOR RECORDS FOR LAMBTON DURING YEAR 1921

In the current report of the board of license commissioners for Ontario are some very interesting facts and figures concerning the liquor records for some years past in Sarnia and Lambton county. It is the sixth annual report covering the operation of the Ontario temperance act.

Statistics for the year closing April 30, 1921, included in the publication show the following concerning Lambton county and the city of Sarnia. Prosecutions by provincial officers for infractions of the Ontario temperance act in Lambton east, 72 with 9 dismissals; amounts collected and payable to the province for fines imposed under the act, Lambton east \$2,874, Lambton west, \$7,045; expenses of enforcing the act, Lambton east, \$2,341; Lambton west, \$3,241; numbers of standard hotels, Lambton east 13, Lambton west 16. Another table shows the number of commitments to each goal for drunkenness from 1911 to 1921, and in this table Sarnia is credited with the following figures: 1911, 76; 1912, 90; 1913, 157; 1914, 237; 1915, 138; 1916, 132; 1917, 115; 1918, 42; 1919, 9; 1920, 30; 1921, 38.

### VALUE OF CANADIAN MOTOR HIGHWAYS

A remarkable increase in the volume of motor traffic into Canada, in 1921 is shown by the returns compiled by the Department of Customs. According to their registrations, 617,285 automobiles entered Canada for touring purposes during the calendar year 1921. Of these 615,074 remained for less than one month and 2,211 for a period of more than one month and less than six months. The total number for 1920 was only 93,300 or an increase of 523,985 cars in one year. Allowing an average expenditure of \$25 per day including gasoline and garage charges for the first class of car and an average length of stay of seven days, this traffic represents an expenditure of over \$107,000,000 while the 2nd class of car on the basis of an estimated expenditure of \$20 per day for thirty days was worth approximately \$1,326,600. This means that the motor highways of Canada brought in a foreign revenue last year of \$108,326,600. Estimated on a five per cent basis it means that improved roads are worth over two billion dollars to this country without taking into account the service they render Canadians themselves.

The registrations according to provinces were: Nova Scotia, 223; Prince Edward Island, 22; New Brunswick, 1,826; Quebec, 43,264; Ontario, 537,283; Manitoba, 8,020; Saskatchewan, 427; Alberta, 363; British Columbia, 25,957.

### GOVERNMENT CO-OPERATION REGARDING EX-SERVICE MEN

Co-operation and assistance by the Dominion Government in the burial of ex-service men who die from wounds or sickness contracted in the war has now been authorized by order-in-council. The Imperial Graves Commission has fixed August 31st, 1921, as the termination of the war as regards its operations, and that therefore deaths occurring after that date are not covered by the authority of that commission or its Canadian Agency. Special action has consequently been made necessary by the Canadian authorities as regards war veterans who may die after that date from wounds or illness contracted in service. It is pointed out that the Canadian Government is already co-operating in the matter of personal inscriptions to the extent of bearing the cost of such inscriptions rather than have it borne by the relatives of the deceased soldier or sailor. The action now authorized by order-in-council is that the Government of Canada bear the cost of the erection of a headstone for the grave in Canada for each member of His Majesty's naval and military forces whose death occurred or shall occur during the period between September 1st, 1921, and August 31st, 1923, under such circumstances and from such causes as would have brought the death within the scope of the operations of the Imperial War Graves Commission up to August 31st, 1921. The order-in-council further provides that the cost of the headstone is not to exceed \$50.
