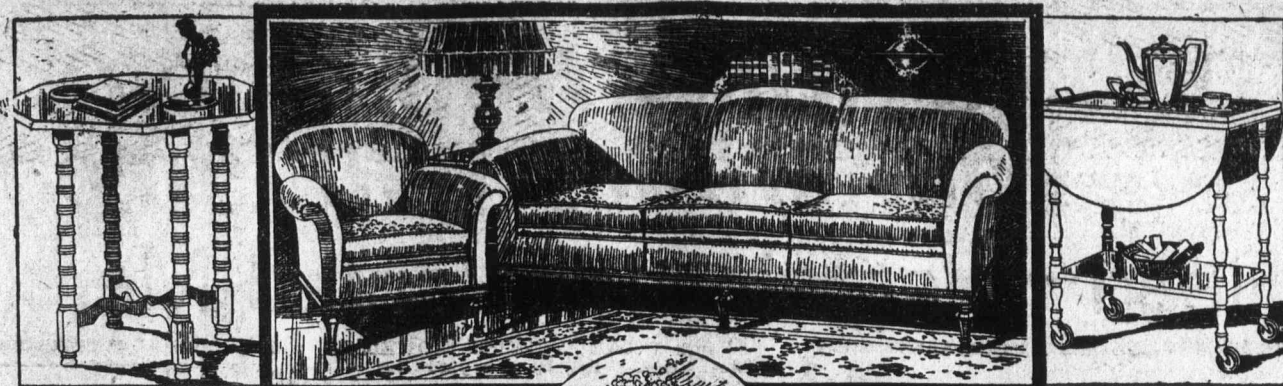

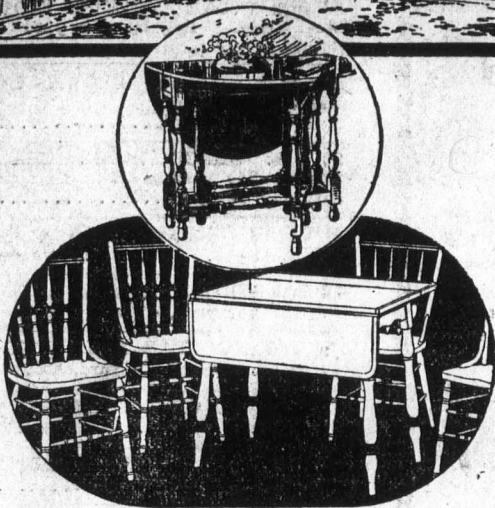

Dundee Man Going Out to Join

Scotsmen are famous as adventurers and as pioneers, but surely few men have waited until they had passed the allotted span of three score and ten years ere they set out on their adventures, as is to happen in the case of Mr. Alex. Watson, retired mill engineer, Gibson Terrace, Dundee, who at the age of 74, is leaving for Canada to join his three brothers, who are farmers there.

Mr. Basil Denning of Hamilton is spending a few days with his mother,

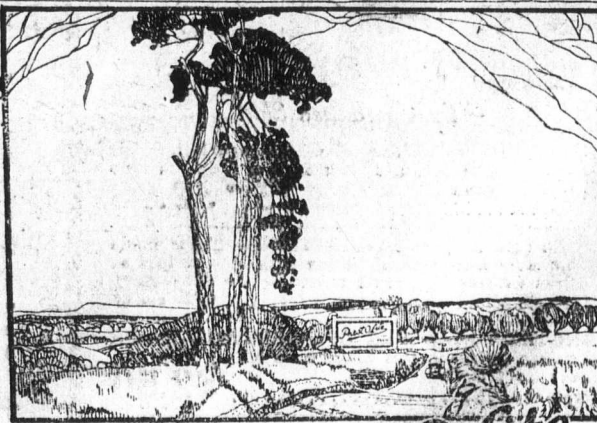
Mrs. Elmer Langford, Mrs. Orville Dowling and little family have returned to their home in Port Huron.
