Four Privates of 30th Regt. escaped from St. Georges on Tuesday night last in his Worship the Mayor's boat Corsair. This boat for safe keeping had been moored in Mullet bay, some distance from the town of St. Georges: one of the men was missing at last; and it was immediately suspected, he would attempt to leave the Island. The suspicion was in some measure confirmed, by a boat being seen at 9 o'clock going through the harbour of St. Georges. The Government boat Waterloo, in which was the adjutant of the Regt, and the private boat Harrington, immediately put to sea, in quest of the deserters, but returned about midnight having failed in their search. *Bermuda Gaz.
