



19,440 50. The executive say that but for the inclement ent weather of the last few days the ex-hibition would have been a financial success. The public grants were : Province of New Brunswick \$3,000, City of St. John \$2,000 -Brunswick \$3,000, City of St. John \$2,000 — as against combined grants last year amount-ing to \$6,500. The prizes awarded this year called for the payment of \$634.10 more than last year. The payments for prizes and judges exceed the public grants by \$1,439.60. The executive pointed out that their efforts are along the same lines as those of the provincial government in the interests of the farmers and stock raisers, and therefore arge that an annual provincial grant should be made sufficient to meet the prize list. The prize list this year exceeded that of 1895 by \$3,000. The statement was made that an annual provincial grant of \$5,000 and a city grant of \$5,000 would make the association's position secure. The guncotton, 700 pounds of which was used, was sent fron Barcelona to Admia Manterola, commanding the port of Havana, and was either stolen from the magazine, where the stuff was stored, or taken away with the knowledge of the officials in charg. The torpedoes were exploded by contast with the keel of the Maine as she swung at anchor.

The Soudan Chieftain Killed. Cairo, November 25.--Lord Cromer, the British minister here, has received the follow-ing despatch from General Kitchener:--"Wingate's force came up with the Khalifa's force seven miles south east of Godid and attacked it. After a sharp fight we took his position. The Khalifa, who was surrounded by a bodyguard of emirs, was killed, and all the principal emirs were killed or captured except Osman Digns, who escaped." The dervishes were utterly defeated, their whole camp was taken and thousands sur-rendered. A large number of women, chil-dren and cattle also fell into the hands of the Anglo-Egyptian force. The Khalifa, referred to as being killed in battle, is Abdullah El Tsishi, the great chieftain of the Soudan, who has given the British so much trouble.
