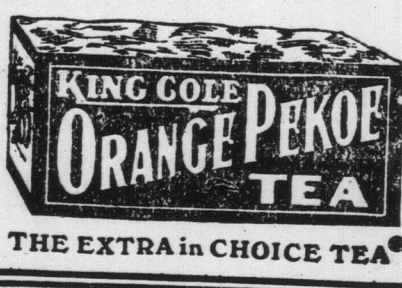

Maritime Students' Conference Held at Deep Brook.

[Special to the MONITOR] The annual Maritime Students' Conference of the Young Women's Christian Association, was held in Deep Brook this year from July 3rd to 11th and a most successful one from every view point except that of the weather. There was a large attendance of 80, not including chance visitors.

Among the officers and leaders were: Miss W. Thomas, Eastern Student's Secretary of the Y. W. C. A., Dr. Gifford, of the Wesleyan, Theo. College, Montreal, Dr. Line, of Mt. Allison University, Dr. Bronson, of Dalhousie University, Miss Jane Wisdom, Social Service Dept., Halifax, Dr. Jessie Allyn, Missionary of India, Rev. M. L. Orchard and Mrs. Orchard, missionary of India, Mrs. Barker, missionary of Korea, Miss Chappell, missionary of China, Mr. D. G. Cock, missionary of India, Mrs. Hiltz, representing the W. A. of Dartmouth, N. S.

With such leaders and the large number of enthusiastic students, the Bible study and Mission study classes were most inspiring and successful. These classes were held each morning and in the evening "Twilight" mind-table talks on religious topics. The Conference had as its setting, one of the most beautiful spots on the Annapolis Basin, i. e. Deep Brook. In the home-like and comfortable "Sea Breeze," all nestled down like birds in their nests. In the quaint cabins decorated with the pennants and banners of Dalhousie, Mount A., Acadia and U. N. B. were the respective students. Despite the weather all were enthusiastic in the praise of the place and its beauty and of the "Sea Breeze" and the hospitality of its proprietor.

The students enjoyed motor trips to Bear River and Digby and auto rides to Bridgetown and Bear River. "Students' Day" proved highly interesting, instructive and amusing. Then it was that each College entered with competitor and the prize went to the young ladies of the U. N. B.

Mrs. John McAvity, of St. John, Chairman of the Board of Y. W. C. A. of St. John, was the energetic and entertaining hostess of the conference.

Some months before the Conference met, the Rector of Clementsfort, Rev. A. W. L. Smith, invited the members to a special service in St. Matthews Church, Deep Brook, on Sunday evening, July 7th. This invitation was accepted and the conference attended in a body. The church was crowded.

The Bishop of Fredericton, who was at his summer home at Smith's Cove, very kindly came up and addressed the students. His sermon was a memorable one and emphasized the value of service. On Tuesday evening, a missionary meeting was held in the Baptist church. Excellent addresses were given by Miss Winnifred Eaton, Miss K. Marsh, and Rev. M. L. Orchard, missionaries all working under the Baptist Board in India.

The Conference closed on Thursday, all present hoping that Deep Brook and the "Sea Breeze" would be chosen for next year's gathering.

Will Take Prisoners All Merchant Seamen.

AMSTERDAM, July 17—The Telegraph publishes a statement, which it attributes to a reliable source, that German submarine commanders have been ordered as far as possible to make prisoners of the crews of the enemy merchantmen, particularly subordinate members of these crews. The German authorities, it says, intend to treat them not as civilian war prisoners, but to put them to most severe regime of ordinary prisoners.

It is Time to Spray Potatoes.

The U. S. Government report is out, which shows that the state of Maine has only 112,000 acres of potatoes this year, a falling off of 38,000 acres from last year. The decrease in the New Brunswick acreage is about the same. There is not a state in all New England that has more potatoes planted than last year. If there is a full bumper crop, there will probably be enough potatoes to go around. If we have as much blight as last year, it is hard to say how short the crop will be or how high the price will be, but it seems probable that with average blight conditions the crop will be short and the price high.

The tests in the Annapolis Royal school plot last year, showed that the unsprayed plot gave 75 bushels per acre, while the plot that was sprayed gave at the rate of 221 bushels per acre. At St. Anne's College, at Church Point, the plot sprayed under the direction of Father LeChantoux, gave 300 bushels per acre, while the unsprayed portion of the field yielded at the rate of 150 bushels per acre. Tests at various experimental stations over a period of years, show an average increase of from not less than 90 and running to nearly 100 bushels per acre, due to spraying.

Bordeaux made according to the 4-4-4 formula, to which any of the common poisons may be added with safety is the standard potato spray. Bordeaux may be applied in any way so long as every portion of the plant is wet. The best method of application is of course the traction sprayer, and the next probably the power sprayer and the spray gun. A hand or barrel sprayer or even a knapsack sprayer will do good work if one takes enough time or if one has no other means of applying spray a common garden watering can or a bucket and whisk broom may be used. The idea is to wet every portion of the plant thoroughly by one means or another. Apply the first spray, if possible, before July 20 and repeat every two weeks until frost.

In one field last season, the sprayed plants remained green for 40 days longer than the unsprayed. The increased yield in that case was slightly over 200 bushels per acre. Every day a field is kept green it grows and stores about 5 bushels of potato tubers per acre. Three days growth will pay for all of the material and labour for spraying five times.

No one can afford to neglect spraying their potatoes this year.

Norwegian Returned Decorations to Germany.

Hans Olsen, one of Norway's best known pilots, who for years piloted the German Emperor's yacht on its summer cruises in Norwegian waters, has returned to the German Legation the numerous decorations given him by the Emperor. He wrote the German minister that the decorations were returned as a protest against the shameful murder and cruel massacre of Norwegian sailors, many of them his friends, by German submarines.
