MY DELEGATION HAS NO MAGIC ANSWERS TO THESE

DIFFICULTIES. NOR DO WE BELIEVE THAT THE COMMISSION ALONE CAN
SOLVE PROBLEMS WHICH ARE INEVITABLY WITHIN THE PURVIEW OF STATES
PARTIES AND THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY. BUT THE COMMISSION IS THE
LOGICAL STARTING POINT FOR DISCUSSION. WE BELIEVE THAT, BASED
ON THE USEFUL REPORT OF THE MEETING OF CHAIRPERSONS OF
TREATY-BASED MONITORING BODIES, A BEGINNING CAN BE MADE. A
NUMBER OF DELEGATIONS, CANADA AMONG THEM, IS OF THE OPINION THAT
THE COMMISSION SHOULD UNDERTAKE CONSULTATIONS BY MEANS OF AN
OPEN-ENDED WORKING GROUP, BEGINNING AT THE NEXT SESSION, WITH
THE IDEA OF REVIEWING A RANGE OF POSSIBLE SOLUTIONS. IN THIS
WAY WE CAN, IN A RELATIVELY INFORMAL AND RELAXED ENVIRONMENT,
ANALYZE THE PROBLEMS AND COME TO GRIPS WITH POSSIBLE REMEDIAL
MEASURES.

A SECOND THEME OF INTEREST TO CANADA IS THE WORLD INFORMATION CAMPAIGN, WHICH WAS LAUNCHED ON THE OCCASION OF THE FORTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE UNIVERSAL DECLARATION OF HUMAN RIGHTS DURING THE LAST SESSION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY. OUR INTERESTS IN THIS TOPIC ARE BROAD, BUT TODAY WE WISH TO FOCUS ON ONLY A COUPLE OF SUB-TOPICS, SOME OF WHICH WERE ADDRESSED IN THE UNDER-SECRETARY-GENERAL'S OPENING REMARKS.

FIRST, MY DELEGATION IS PLEASED THAT THE NON-GOVERNMENTAL SECTOR HAS BEEN INFORMALLY CONSULTED CONCERNING THE CONTOURS OF THE WORLD CAMPAIGN. WE REGARD THE NGO SECTOR AS CRUCIAL TO ITS EVENTUAL SUCCESS, SINCE NGOS WILL EVENTUALLY
