Chef Pierre Pédèche has won many international gold medals and, on the ground floor, the Bistro Chez Antoine is a favourite meeting spot in the city. The Radisson, close to the World Trade Centre and the Montréal Convention Centre, is obviously an ideally-located hotel for delegates and visitors attending ICAO functions.

Also across the street is the Bonaventure Hotel atop a full shopping complex and the largest exhibition hall in Montréal. The hotel has direct access to the Métro subway system providing fast and problem-free transportation to the Olympic Stadium or Old Montréal. A short walk away is the Queen Elizabeth Hotel, a luxurious
