

The fourth paragraph concerns the law enforcement measures provided for in the relevant international conventions and reformulates in more positive terms the ideas already contained in paragraph 7 of resolution 40/61.

The fifth paragraph concerning adherence to existing conventions requests the Secretary-General to appeal to all States that have not already done so to consider becoming party to these conventions.

The sixth, seventh and eighth paragraphs concern the efforts of the ICAO and IMO in the struggle against terrorism.

The ninth paragraph requests the UPU and WTO, within their respective competences, to consider what further measures could usefully be taken to combat and eliminate terrorism.

Paragraphs 10 and 11 call for a re-examination of the question at the forty-fourth session of the General Assembly.

Mr. Chairman , you have undoubtedly realized that draft resolution A/C.6/42/L.2\* is largely based on the text of resolution 40/61, which, it should be remembered, was adopted without a vote by the General Assembly the last time it considered the question of terrorism. It is also clear from this document that the new elements it contains involve modest but practical measures that the international community can and should take to continue its struggle to eliminate terrorism, and that as such it also merits the Assembly's unanimous support.
