## MINISTER'S ACTIONS

Hon. Flora MacDonald (Kingston and the Islands): Madam Speaker, I would refer the Secretary of State to page 2902 of the Senate *Hansard* of October 27 of this year where Senator Perrault is reported to have stated, when referring to the \$1.5 billion continuous reduction:

Honourable senators, this is the response provided by the Minister of Finance.

I would like to ask whether or not the Secretary of State has spoken to the Minister of Finance who has, at various times, made it very clear that there will be a \$1.5 billion lowering of commitments to the provinces, to the community colleges and universities and to health care in the amount of money transferred by the federal government? Has he talked to the Minister of Finance about that, and has he and will he look at the Senate record, and will he then, on the basis of his previous statement, agree to put in his resignation from the point of view that he has said there would be no reduction coming up?

I do not know how many hours, when she should be making representations to the Ontario government to do its bit towards education, she spends in searching through *Hansard* to try to find a misprint somewhere so that she can misquote somebody.
