ASSESSORS TOLD HOW BEST TO PROCEED

Some Examples.

The following examples will serve for illustrations: A owns a farm of 100 acres, having a barn which cost \$1000 and a house which cost \$2000. The assessor, with no difficulty, decides that the barn adds \$500 to the value of the land and the house \$700. 
