

## PERSEY CATTLE BREEDERS MEET

Decision Made to Help in Purifying City's Milk Supply.

## NEW OFFICERS ELECTED

Samuel Lyons of Norval is President—B. A. Bull is Secretary.

The annual meeting of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club was held in the Prince George Hotel yesterday afternoon, with about 80 members in attendance. It was shown during the progress of the meeting that the standard of milk in Toronto had been raised from 3 to 3.25 per cent, butter fat, thus giving Toronto the second highest class of milk of any city on the continent, Washington, D.C., being first.

Barclay A. Bull, secretary of the club, urged the members as successful dairymen to take a stand for the purification of the city dairy supply. He explained that they could do much towards this end by proper ventilation, and by exercising reasonable care for sanitation in milking and in caring for their product until it is placed upon the market.

In the discussion on the statement that several agents were going around circulating false statements regarding tuberculosis in Jerseys, it was shown that the disease had never been known among the cattle of the city of Jersey, and that even in Canada they were no more infected if as much as are other breeds.

The club has at present negotiations pending for reciprocal relations with the American Club. It was found necessary to revise certain sections of the constitution of the club, and the secretary was instructed to act with the accountant at Ottawa and report at the next meeting.

Remarkable Series of Operations Performed in Baltimore Hospital Upon Young Canadian.

BALTIMORE, Md., Feb. 4.—With a part of his forehead substituted for new lips, Ross Allen, a young Canadian, at a hospital here, seems to be in a favorable way to have practically the whole of his face newly shaped.

Allen entered the hospital about two months ago with his face disfigured from an accident in a sawmill five years previously. His nose and lips were missing.

A section of flesh shaped to the form of his lower lip was cut on his forehead in December and a grafting juncture made with the lip base.

The lip section was severed from the arm and the lip shaped. The same procedure was followed in the upper lip treatment.

When Allen accumulates sufficient strength for another operation, the surgeons will try to build him a new nose.

RUSH SUPPLIES OF ARMS FOR MEXICAN REBELS

Villa Sends Representative to Thank President Wilson for Permission to Import Guns.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Modern arms and ammunition are already being rushed to Texas for transmission across the border to Villa. This much was admitted today at the headquarters of the Quirana Junta, in this city. The shipments followed immediately on the issue of President Wilson's proclamation lifting the embargo issued last night. By the first of this week Villa will have received arms and rapid-fire armament with plenty of fresh ammunition, and it is believed Torreon will soon fall.

Before leaving Durango for Chihuahua today Villa sent his legal adviser to call on Brig.-Gen. Hugh L. Scott, United States commander at El Paso, Texas, to thank President Wilson, thru Scott, for lifting the embargo on the importation of arms. Attorney Aguirre, Benavides also requested the release of 1,500,000 rounds of ammunition, five thousand rifles and several machine guns seized by the United States troops.

Villa also began placing orders for carloads of ammunition. Already one million rounds have been ordered rushed for use in the coming Torreon campaign.

NOVA SCOTIA CREAMERIES.

(Special Correspondent.)

HALIFAX, Feb. 3.—It is not generally known, but it is a fact nevertheless, that the output of the creameries of Nova Scotia increased in 1913 60 per cent. In other words, the production of butter in the creameries of Nova Scotia in 1913 was 250,000 pounds more than it was in 1912. The respective figures are:

1912 ..... 420,000  
1913 ..... 650,000

## MORE MEN NEEDED FOR POLICE DUTY

Chief Constable Says Now is Time to Get Additional "Cops."

## ARRESTS INCREASED

But Considering Its Size, Toronto Has Not Much Crime.

The report of the chief constable for 1913, issued yesterday, shows that the total number of persons arrested or summoned by the police was 39,654, an increase of 5274 over the previous year. All of the male sex, as the number of females arrested showed a decrease of eleven. Of the charges laid, 18,221 were withdrawn or dismissed. Among the breaches of the law which showed increases compared with 1912 were: Drunk and disorderly, 2480; city by-laws, 425; housebreaking, 103; indecent assault, 61; Lord's Day Act, 372; neglect of children, 294; theft, 233; trespass, 506; vagrancy, 570.

Among the decreases noted were: Cruelty to animals, 70; keepers, inmates and frequenters of disorderly houses, 158; non-payment of wages, 49. Five hundred and sixty-four juveniles were arrested for indictable offences. Property to the reported value of \$980,411, including automobiles, valued at \$53,375, was lost or stolen, and property valued at \$260,315 was recovered by the police.

There were no murders in Toronto during the year, according to the detective department, the felonious offences showed a net increase of 1124. There were 15 burglaries, 457 cases of house and shopbreaking, 41 robberies with violence, 94 cases of pocketpicking and 4587 thefts.

More Men Needed.

The chief recommends that the inspector of detectives be given more men for detective duty. He also recommends that a second motor ambulance convertible for use as a patrol wagon, be purchased.

Referring to the mounted corps, the chief remarks that "it is growing more and more difficult to get the right stamp of horses, even at much higher prices."

The strength of the force of Jan. 1 was 626, an increase of 38. The chief says that it is imperative that the force should be brought up to a total of seven hundred. He adds that the recruiting of eligible men is now less difficult than for some years, and applications by letter are being received in greater numbers.

Chief Graessli thinks traffic regulation is improving as the police become more proficient and the public have a better understanding of what they should do.

The returns from the license department show receipts of \$96,692, an increase of \$11,269.

The report of the medical officer of the department showed that there had been a larger number of men on the sick list than ever before, but it is noted that for the first time there have been no cases of typhoid fever.

TORONTO IS TWELFTH.

A list of the registrations of the larger universities of North America shows Toronto to be twelfth of the list, with a total enrolment of 4600. Columbia is first from the standpoint of size, boasting of 9229 students.

California, Chicago, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Harvard, Cornell, New York, Illinois and Iowa, are above Toronto in point of numbers. Yale stands 17th on the list, with a registration of 2283. Queen's University is 29th, with 1200 students.

CHARGED WITH STEALING MONEY FROM HIS FIRM.

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

The wheel gained momentum for a hundred feet or so, then knocked over a fence at the side of the road and went down a precipitous incline to Mrs. Seymour's home.
