BATTALION HELD **MARCHES TO PARK**

Officers Were Mounted and and Bands Were in Attendance

WENT IN PLATOONS

Imposing Spectacle When Return Was Made in Full Strength.

Both the 19th and 20th battalions held route marches from the Exhibition Park camp to High Park and back again yesterday afternon. The 20th battalion's march was a "section route-march," each platoon going separately to High Park, where they continued into one regiment before turning back. The 19th battalion paraded out of the camp headed by their band of pipers and with all the officers mounted. They made quite an imposing spectacle.

Lieut. G. S. Strathy and Lieut. H. Bruce-Robertson have been appointed to the No. 2 casualty clearing hospital now being organized.

There were 144 men in the camp's stationery hospitally esterday. Seventy per cent. of the cases are of men who are sick with influenza.


