

Sitzinger's Bavari-an army against the Russian left wing in the Carpathian position have now been definitely stopped. The Russians have reoccupied the hill at the Village of Cavtchik, four miles westward of Koziomoka, and overlooking the Mun-kacz-Stryf road. This attempted Ger-man advance northward has been the only serious threat that the Russians and 2-stryp road. Generally the situation in the southern campaign is now very favor-able to the Russians. The Germans are ready to sac-rifice Hungary, at least 'economically, by fighting a series of rear-guard ac-tions and by drawing the Russians down towards the middle Danube. This would relieve the Silesian flank, where great German forces are now being deployed from Cracow, chiefly along the Donajec River. To Protect Cracow., Von Hindenburg retains in nearly full strength his extreme northern army, which attempted to reach the Niemen in February along the borders of East Prussia, but he has sent great numbers of men from their winter-position on the Narew, Bzura and Rawka rivers southward to join the Austrians of the Pilica and the Nide. making a continuous and strongly-





The newspaper says the senator, who is a frequent caller at the house of Prince Von Buelow, the German ambassador to Rome, makes the state-ment that he heard from the prince a "confession" which was substantially as follows: "Unfortunately the Italian-Austrian

"Unfortunately the Italian-Austrian conversations are not proceeding sat-isfactorily. Their failure will be fol-lowed by a rupture between Rome and Vienna. This will be refretted in Germany. I am sorry to affirm that in this sad eventuality Germany will do her duty to the end by the side of Austria." Continuing, Senator Carafa declares that he repeated his conversation to Premier Salandra, who did not seem surprised at it. On the contrary, he said to the senator:

"Impelled by the paramount interests of our country we will proceed with our duty against all our antagonists."
