BEAT PROVIDENCE OUT OF PENNANT

Leafs Took Two Games and Handed the Rag to Buffalo Club.

They all look alike. Playing sparkling ball the Leafs downed the champion Grays twice yesterday and just about killed any chance the Providence outfit had for the pennant.

The Grays were completely baffled by McTigue's grand twirling in the first game, and the Leafs scored a shutout, 6 to 0. McTigue sent in three runs himself with a homer. Backed up by snappy fielding Herbert won the second fixture, 3 to 1.

Neal Ball was the sensation of both fixtures with several pieces of snappy fielding and quick throws. The Leafs look good to take at least one game today, and hand the pennant to Buffalo. Providence's only chance is to win two, while Buffalo must drop a like number, an outside chance.

McTigue started out like a winner in the first game by striking out the side and he never let the visitors score. Toronto scored six.

The Leafs waited until the third before breaking in. Ball fanned, but McTigue walked. Williams raised a foul, but Ball poked a hit into centre. Gilbert supplied the single to score McTigue. McTigue pitched himself out of holes in the second and fourth. He put the game away in the last when he hit the eighth. Gilbert beat one to deep shore. McTigue threw Graham's punt high, and the bases were full. Kocher's pop was let fall at the plate and an infield fly, but it blew foul. Kocher put up a fly to second. Wares' effort went about ten feet toward third. McTigue pitched leaving the bases still filled. Ball flied to left, scoring Daley. McTigue plastered it into deep right field bleachers for a home run, with two ahead of him. Williams fouled to catcher. The Leafs fielded sharply at all times.
