complete Hostility, is rendered more reprehensible from the Confideration that just before this Aggreffion he held a Station within the Jurifdiction of the United States, in the Waters of the Chefapeake, where, while he enjoyed the Rights of Hospitality, he projected this Attack against the Ship of a Neutral Power, whofe Commander, relying on the good Faith of His Majefty's Government, and the friendly Relations fubfifting between Great Britain and the United States, could not have fuspected the Defign. I might state other Examples of great Indignity and Outrage, many of which are of recent Date, to which the United States have been exposed, off their Coaft, and even within feveral of their Harbours, from the British Squadron; but it is improper to mingle them with the prefent more ferious Caufe of Complaint. I have called your Attention to this Subject, in full Confidence that His Majefty's Go. vernment will fee in the Act complained of, a flag grant Abuse of itsown Authority, and that it will not hesitate to enable me to communicate to my Government, without Delay, a frank Difavowal of the Principle on which it was made, and its Affurance that the Officer who is refponfible for it, shall fuffer, the Punishment which fo unexampled an Aggreffion. on the Sovereignty of a Neutral Nation justity deferves.
