ENDORSE HIS WORDS.

It has been said in some quarters that too much importance has been attached to the recent after-dinner utattached to the recent after-dinner utterances of Commander Sims of the United States battleship Minnesota, at the Guidhall banquet in London on Dec. 3, to the officers of the visiting American fleet. Commander Sims words, to which exception has been taken in several countries, and especially in Germany, were to the effect that if the time came when the British Empire was menaced by an external enemy, the British might count on every man every dollar of their kindred across the sea.

From one standpoint too much importance might easily be attached to such words, strong as they are. The speech was an after-dinner one, delivered under circumstances permitting much latitude of expression. That there should, accordingly, be any serious representations to Washington by the agents of foreign governments, or that the United States admiristration should regard the commander as deserving of more, at most than the mildiest reprimend, is hardly to be imagined.

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
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
