YORK COUNTY ROADS **CALL FOR \$333,000**

Vast Increase of Appropriation Over Previous Years for Highways.

WORK FOR SOLDIERS

County to Spend \$100,000 if City and Government Guarantee \$233,000

County Engineer James read the re-port of the Toronto and York Roads Commission to the county council yes-

terday morning.
With the exception of the lake shore, culverts have been provided on all roads. Improvements have been made on the Kennedy, Vaughan, Weston and Don Mills roads, but the work on the Kingston road is held up on account of the railway's refusal to ship stone to Port Union.

A dangerous curve near Thistle town has been eliminated, also one on the Pine Orchard road. Thirty new direction signs have been erected in the county.

Some criticism of the road com-mission's handling of the work on the Weston, Markham, Sutton, Mount Albert. Lloydtown and King roads and North Yonge street was made by Reeves Wallace and Gardhouse. Reeve Pugsley was also of the opinion that the roads should be kept in good condition even if high taxes were necessary to do so.




