TORONTO JUNCTION, May 31.—The customs receipts for the port of Toronto Junction show an increase over the corresponding month of last year of \$3742.88. The figures are: May, 1907, \$21,109.63; May, 1906, \$17,366.74; increase, \$3742.88.

North York Visitors.
About 130 North York school teachers came in over the Metropolitan Railway yesterday morning, and spent the day in sight-seeing at the various seats of learning in the city. The visitors arrived shortly after 9 o'clock, and at 10 o'clock were addressed by the minister of education, Hon. Dr. Fyfe, at the Normal School. The remainder of the forenoon was spent in visiting the objects of interest in the education department. In the afternoon they visited the university, previous to which a short time was spent at the parliament buildings. At the university, Principal Hutton and Prof. Carruthers spoke briefly on "Greek and Roman Architecture." After luncheon the visitors returned home by a late car on the Metropolitan.

Enjoyed Their Visit.
To the number of about 150, the South York teachers, who, on Thursday, spent the day in convention in the old courthouse on Adelaide-street, yesterday divided up into groups of half a dozen or more and visited a number of the city schools. At Queen Alexandra, Ryerson, King Edward, Church and Winchester, the manual training classes proved a source of great interest. Later in the day they assembled in the Biological Building, up at the university, where Professor Chant entertained the members with a lecture, which was greatly appreciated. The visitors left for home last night, delighted with the success of the convention and the courtesy extended by their city conferees.

Thistle-town.
THISTLETOWN, May 31.—The Etobicoke Township Council will meet in this village on Monday afternoon. This is in accordance with the usual custom of holding one meeting here during the year. North Toronto.
NORTH TORONTO, May 31.—A public meeting in the interest of Esten Williams, the independent candidate in the by-election for West York, was held in the town hall to-night. About 30 electors were present. James Gillespie was chairman. Williams spoke for some time on his platform as a workman's candidate, and contended that the labor unions should have parliamentary recognition, the same as doctors and lawyers. He objected to the three-man clause and predicted that at the next general election the leader of the opposition will make his platform the improvement of the government to rescind that measure. "Law reform" was next dealt with. He had no apology to offer for opposing the government candidate in this by-election, as a good kicker, as an independent, will do more good than a back-bencher.
