

DOESN'T PAY TO DECEIVE PRESTON'S TRIP TO CANADA

Commissioner of Immigration Says Sharp Practices May Ruin Trade in Britain.

W. T. R. Preston, Canadian Commissioner of Immigration in Great Britain, accompanied the British parliamentary party to Toronto on Saturday, but, on account of pressure of business at his London office, is compelled to return at once.

He expressed himself as being perfectly satisfied with the manner in which immigrants have been coming into Canada. They were a good class and there was plenty of employment for all.

Mr. Preston was not very enthusiastic over the methods which Canadians were using to obtain their proportion of the trade of England.
