A special musical service was rendered by the choir under the direction of Mr. W. H. Hewlett. Printed orders of services were in the hands of the congregation, and the music was thoroughly entered into and enjoyed by all. Solos were sung by Miss Eva Roblyn. Mr. W. H. Skinner and Mr. Rechab Tandy, the celebrated tenor of Toronto, who sang several solos with fine effect, his rich, full, tenor voice being a delight to all.

—The services in Knox Church, South London, were in keeping with the festive celebration. Easter lilies and carnations decorated the reading desk and platform in profusion. Rev. J. G. Stuvies, the pastor, preached at both services, in the morning taking as his text, Revelations, I, 4. The music was a special feature. In the morning, Dudley Buck's "Deum," arranged from Mendelssohn's "Elijah," with rendered with spirit by the choir, the solos being Misses Street and Martin, while the quartet was composed of Misses Leys and Kemp, and Messrs. Irwin and Givens. "This is the Day" was given a splendid rendition at the offertory. In the evening the anthem was "O, for the Wings of a Dove," the difficult solo being sung by Miss Martin sang "Resurrexit," by Tosti, words by Frederic E. Wetherly. In beautiful voice and expression, Mr. P. L. Evans, a special did choir, and they did him great credit at yesterday's services.

EASTER IN THE CHURCHES.
The services in all the churches yesterday were emblematic of Easter. The musical forces were fully exercised and revealed the very creditable standard to which the church music of London has attained. "Christ is Risen" was the keynote of most of the morning services, and the lessons derived from this fundamental truth of the Christian religion were again applied. Easter lilies and other floral tokens ornamented the pulpits and platforms. Sunday school sessions, too, largely partook of the celebration. The observance of Easter in Protestant churches has become more general and pronounced in the past few years.

AN ACCUSING CONSCIENCE.
Orangeville, Ont., Two years ago, while Mr. Thomas Robinson, of London, was visiting friends here, he lost a \$400 diamond ring, and no amount of searching revealed its place. At length the ring was given up for lost, and no more was thought of the matter until a few days ago. A little parcel, neatly tied up, came through Canada mail, addressed to Mr. Harry Robinson, of this town. It contained the long-lost ring. No explanation or mark, indicating where it came from, accompanied the parcel, and the only solution of the mystery is that some person stole the ring, and his conscience would not let the thief rest until the stolen article was returned.

MASS AT ST. MARY'S CHURCH.
A large congregation assembled at St. Mary's Church, Hill street, yesterday, at morning service. The edifice presented a very bright and pretty appearance, being decorated with a profusion of flowers, especially the Easter lily. Much credit is due the Altar Society, who had this part in hand. The special music was of a high standard. Miss M. Connor presided at the organ in an efficient manner, and the orchestra was led by a violin solo, "Nearer, My God, to Thee," by Mrs. Traher and Misses Lenahan, sopranos; Miss N. Kelly, alto, and Messrs. Jan Kearney, James Cresswell, W. Traher and Jas. Connor.

Rev. Father Brady preached an earnest and able discourse from Mark, xvi, 1-7. He spoke of Christ's resurrection and the lessons it taught. The handsome sum of \$225, for the support of the clergy, was taken in collections during Easter services.

Will Stick To Their Own.

Hospital Trust Will Not Be Represented on the Civic Committee.

An Emphatic Resolution—They Worked for Nearly Twelve Months on the Question, and Are of the Same Opinion Still.

The hospital trust will not send a representative to the civic hospital building committee. Their position on this matter was stated emphatically at the meeting on Saturday afternoon, when the question was raised by Mr. C. F. Compin.

Mr. Gilmour held that no good would be gained by representation on the committee. Their views have been submitted to the council in the shape of plans, on which they had worked for nearly twelve months, and they were of the same opinion still.

Mr. Purdon said it was his opinion that the ratepayers who voted on the belief that the plans submitted would be carried out and also that the new hospital would be built by the trust. The trust, he thought, had a legal right to say, if it chose, that no stone of the old building could be touched.

Mr. Gilmour was not inclined to go that far.

Finally it was decided to reply to the invitation of the building committee as follows:

"The hospital trust were requested by the city council to report to them regarding the erection of a new hospital. The trust considered the question fully in all its aspects, and finally decided to adopt the plans prepared by Messrs. Moore & Henry, and reported to the city council in accordance with the belief that its erection would be according to the plans adopted by the trust, and approved of by the great majority of the medical profession in the city."

Applications for positions on the nursing staff were received from Miss May Essex, 539 Colborne street, city; Miss Isabel Munro, Nairn; Miss Florence J. Mitchell, Strathroy; Miss Hannah M. Purdon, 25 Stanley street, city. They were all accepted.

Accounts amounting to \$377 73 were presented by W. T. Claris and Rev. Robert Johnston, representing the city Ministerial Association, appeared before the trust to further arrangements for conducting religious services by different denominations in turn at the hospital each morning.

The members present were: Col. R. Lewis (chairman), Messrs. J. Gilmour, R. H. Purdon, C. F. Compin and Dr. Bailton.

The Freeport, Ill., Journal, contains the following account of the wedding of Mr. Harry D. Millar, son of Mr. John Millar, formerly of this city, now of Toronto:

"At the home of Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Schofield, on Scholfield street, West Freeport, today at noon, their daughter, Miss Irene E. Schofield, was married to Harry D. Millar, of Burlington, Ia., by Rev. Wm. C. Spencer, pastor of the Baptist Church.

"It was a quiet, but very pretty home wedding, attended only by relatives of the bride and groom. The ceremony was performed in the parlor in front of a large window prettily decorated with palms and flowers. The wedding march was played by Mrs. Robert Schofield as the bride and groom, unattended, took their places. The bride looked very charming in a handsome going-away gown of cadet blue cloth, and she carried the usual bouquet of roses. Dinner was served immediately after the wedding, and at 3:40 o'clock this afternoon Mr. and Mrs. Millar left for their new home at Burlington, Ia.

"The bride belongs to one of the oldest and most prominent Freeport families, her father being a cousin of Lieutenant Gen. John M. Schofield and a nephew of the late Rev. James Schofield, who was the founder of the Baptist Church here.
