Were Well Represented in the  
Judging Competition  
At Fair.

Farm lads of Middlesex County were well represented on the list of prize-winners in the judging competition at the Toronto Exhibition. A judging team selected from the Junior Farmers' Association of this county through a grant made by the county council,

was enabled to travel to the Queen City and capture \$100 in prizes. Entered in the competition were 223 boys, representing 22 counties in the various classes of judging. The scores were keenly contested and the following from Middlesex County proved winners: In heavy horses, W. A. Fowler, Hyde Park, R. 1, took fourteenth place; in beef cattle, W. S. Wilton, Mount Brydges, fifteenth; in grain and roots, John Tull, Christina, seventh; in fruit and vegetables, N. T. Sanderson, London, R. 7, fourth; Harold Pack, Byron, R. 1, seventh; W. S. Wilton, Mount Brydges, ninth, and Roy Weil, London, R. 5, eleventh.

## SHOT WHILE AT WORK AT FAIR

Mrs. Amy Akorn's Jaw Cut by  
Stray Bullet From  
Gallery.

Mrs. Amy Akorn, wife of Alex. Akorn, a ticket-taker, at the World's Fair, was severely injured by a stray bullet from a shooting gallery operated to the south of the Midway on the avenue facing the Transportation building. Mrs. Akorn was at work in the kitchen department of the show commissary, when a bullet whizzed by, cutting into her jaw, and narrowly missing an artery. She suffered another wound in her arm, but whether this was caused by the bullet or by a splinter of wood from the target or side of the shooting gallery, is not known. The physician, who was called to attend her, was unable to say. Mrs. Akorn was taken to St. John Ambulance emergency hospital on the grounds, where she remained for some time, but later returned to her tent.

Protests made by the Midway people were effective in inducing the fair directors to force the proprietor of the shooting gallery to better cover the end of the gallery surrounding the target with a view to preventing any more accidents of the kind. The ineffectual protests against the danger existing had been made previous to the show. This is the second accident of the kind that has occurred at the fair during the past few years, a young man having been similarly injured four years ago.

## J. W. WESTERVELT IS WESTERN LECTURER

To Teach Accounting, Auditing—Prof. Perkins Resigns  
—J. W. Russell Successor.

The Western University has secured J. W. Westervelt, jun., as lecturer in accounting and auditing in the course of commerce and finance to be inaugurated this fall. In addition to having a long business experience as a former accountant, Mr. Westervelt has also had an extended teaching experience, a combination that is very unusual. Mr. Westervelt's addition to the staff of the university insures at the outset that the very highest type of work will be done in the new course leading to a business career. Professor E. H. Perkins has resigned the professorship of geology to accept a similar position at Colby College, Maine. The university is very fortunate in securing to succeed him J. W. Russell, M. A., of Woodstock. Mr. Russell is an honor graduate of McMaster University and was a graduate student at Harvard. He took his geological work under the well-known geologist, Professor J. H. Whitford. He taught for a couple of years in McMaster University and has also taught in collegiate institutions in the province. For a number of years he has been engaged in mining in Cobalt. In spite of his activity in the practical field, however, Professor Russell has been in constant touch with educational work. He is a very able and enthusiastic teacher.

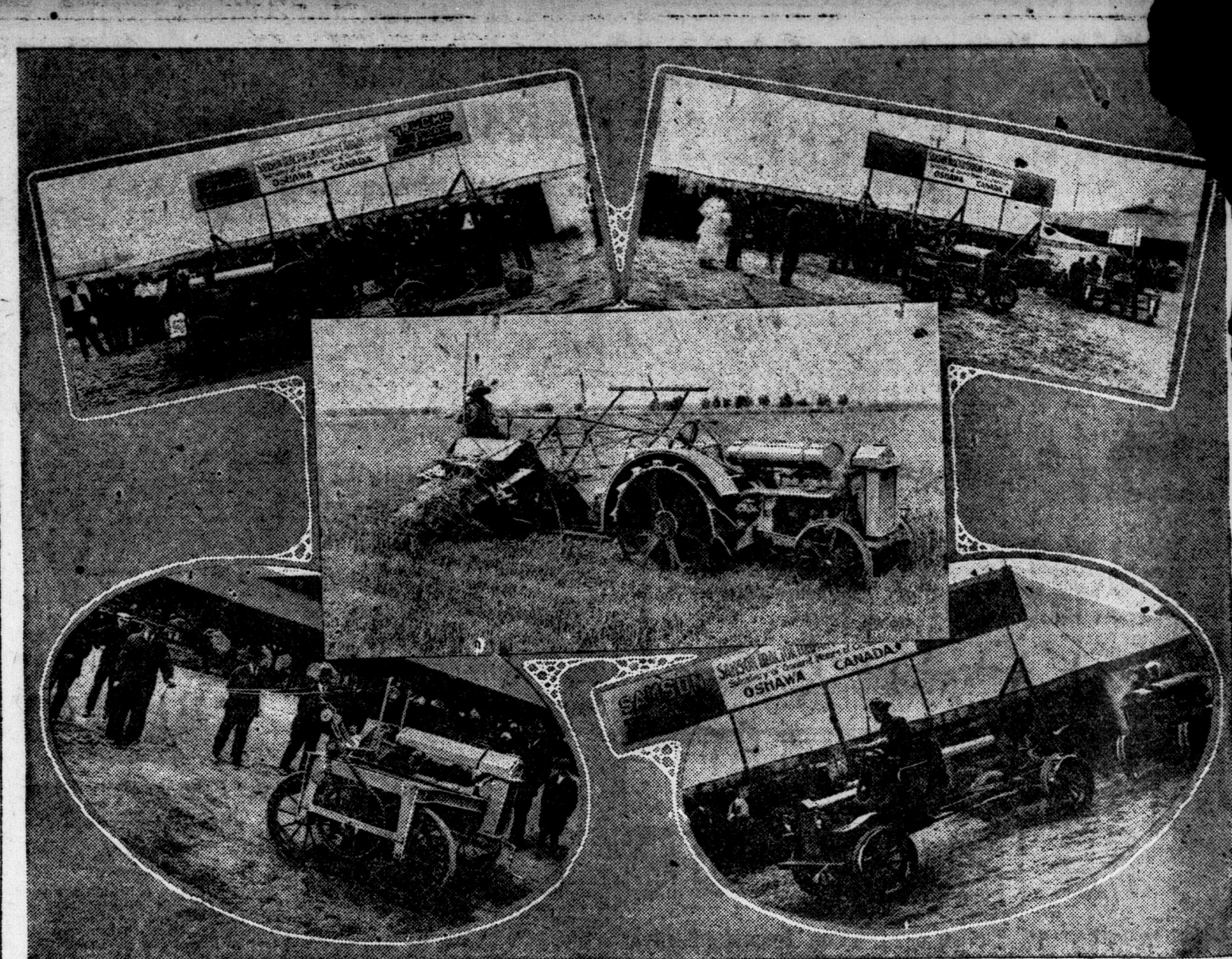

## FATALLY BURNED IN AUTOMOBILE CRASH BARN NEAR STRATFORD DESTROYED BY FIRE

Particulars of Death of John  
McCready Just  
Received.

Ingersoll, Sept. 17.—John McCready, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. J. McCready, John street, was fatally burned in a motor accident in San Francisco on July 12. Full particulars have just been received by Mr. McCready. During a heavy fog descended was motoring on a side street, when he crashed into an automobile that was without lights. It is estimated that over \$1,000 was realized as a result of last night's storm for the memorial fund.

## CRIME CONSPICUOUS BY ITS ABSENCE HERE

According to the police, a new record has been made at the Western Fair this year, in the fact that not a single theft or pocket-picking has been reported. This is the first time in many years that such has been the case. "There were signs posted up by the police to beware of pickpockets. This was apparently unnecessary this year, but it is the wisest plan to post the signs to visitors on their guard," stated Detective Thomas Nickle.

As today is the last big day, it is not expected that any trouble will be experienced. A number of pocket-pickers have been lost, but the majority of cases there have been returned to their rightful owners. The police have experienced very little difficulty in maintaining order, and only a few minor motor accidents have occurred.

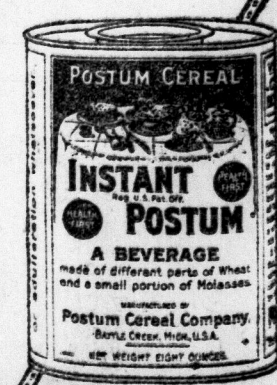
