**CANNOT PROHIBIT THE FRUIT PEDLARS**  
Nor interfere with Present Moving Picture Shows—Queer Ending to Wrestling Bout.

HAMILTON, April 5.—(Special.)—At the markets committee this afternoon Ald. Cooper drew attention to the deplorable condition of the cells at No. 3 police station, and it was decided that should be installed. The city solicitor reported that the council had not the power to prohibit the peddlers of foreign fruit from doing business. Some merchants petitioned the committee to pass a bylaw to keep moving picture shows from locating on the principal streets, and a committee was named to consider the subject. Chairman Gardner stated that the committee could not interfere with those who had already located. The chairman was authorized to get some of the committee rooms touched up.

After working hard for 40 minutes Conkle got the first fall, some one then yelled "Fake," and Conkle refused to go on in the face of such an imputation, and the decision went to Ackerman.

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### LENTEN SERMON

The mid-day Lenten service at St. James' Cathedral yesterday was largely attended. Rev. Canon Welch said the message of holy week was one of reconciliation. The penalty of sin in this world and in the life hereafter was separation from God. Separation from God when its import was recognized was the depth of misery. The essence of sin was man setting up his will in opposition to that of the Almighty.  
The hearth looked upon the gods as beings who would value what man valued. For that reason they gave sacrifices of fruits and living beings to propitiate the gods and attain forgiveness for their wrong doing. The errors of the heathen was in supposing that God could be bribed. God cannot be bribed and He has no desire for revenge.  
To enjoy the presence of God the heart must be holy and the prophet had declared that the sacrifice of ten thousand burnt offerings and of rivers of oil availed nothing. No matter what offerings were made the soul conscious of sin dare not enter the presence of God.  
The arrangement of man from his Creator caused by sin came the atonement of Jesus Christ. That atonement was meant to effect a reconciliation—that is, "at-one-ment" between every sinner who would accept Him as his Saviour. That reconciliation was freely offered to every one who will accept it.

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**CHURCH EXTENSION**  
Presbyterian Union Plans for New Toronto District.  
The Presbyterian Church Extension Union annual meeting was held last night at Chalmers Church, Dundas-street. President Thomas Findlay was chairman.  
G. L. Sutherland, treasurer, reported that about \$2000 had been raised and expended by the society during the past year.  
Rev. Dr. Abraham said that the growth of the city would in the near future require the erection of a number of new churches, and there was an immediate need of provision being made for the Presbyterian families who are settling in the district north of Bloor-street, between Christie and Shaw, and also in the eastern part of the city in the Jones-avenue and Gladstone-section. The Presbyterian Church could save thousands of dollars by purchasing church sites with a view to the future. The union should expend \$500 a year for the purpose of securing sites.  
Rev. J. Herbinson pointed out that the union did important work through the employment of Bible women in the new districts of the city.  
Rev. Dr. Wallace gave an address on the principles of Presbyterianism, and Miss Ingles, St. James-square Presbyterian Church, made an earnest appeal on behalf of the extension work. The following officers were elected: President, Thomas Findlay; vice-president, R. C. Steele and Theron Gibbard; field secretary, Rev. Dr. Abraham; secretary, R. A. Gray; treasurer, G. L. Sutherland; chairman church extension committee, Rev. James Wilson; Rev. J. Herbinson; additional members of executive, Rev. B. C. Tibb, R. W. Murray, Ira H. Thayer and J. B. Thomson.  
The union will endeavor by a canvass from members to increase the income to \$500.

**CANADIAN GRAND OPERA**
