

NEW SPANISH PREMIER OUTLINES HIS POLICIES

Will Remain the Most Radical of Monarchists—Will Settle Religious Questions.

MADRID, Feb. 13.—Premier Jose Canalejas y Mendez, who heads the new cabinet, in a statement to-day declared that not only will he remain the most radical of monarchists, but that the king fully understands his views and program.

The premier said that it was unfortunate that he had not a sufficient majority behind him, and consequently the country at the coming elections, in which all the old electoral machinery would be discarded, must be carried out.

He considered that his reputation would be bankrupt if he did not settle the religious questions, and he proposed to begin by government action in the form of decrees to be followed by legislation.

Negotiations with the Vatican began by his predecessor, Senor Canalejas said, would be continued, but if they failed, he would proceed regardless of the wishes of Rome. The second problem, he added, was the advanced would be the issue of public education, in which Spain was so backward. He also intended to press other social reforms and obligatory military service. "I served in the Cuban campaign," he said, "therefore I understand the inequity of the present system."

NIAGARA POWER DEAL

Has to Do With Corporations Operating in New York State.

ALBANY, N.Y., Feb. 13.—Application has been made to the public service commission by the Niagara and Erie Power Company for authority to issue its stock and \$1,000,000 per cent. 30-year gold bonds, the authorized capital stock of the company being \$100,000. The company also asks for permission to have transferred to it certain property and franchises of the Niagara, Lockport and Ontario Power Co., and the Buffalo and Lake Erie Traction Company, and to begin construction. The latter companies have also applied for permission to make such transfer.

The Niagara and Erie Power Company proposes to operate an electrical transmission and distribution system, beginning at Gardenville, Erie County, and extending through the Counties of Erie and Chautauque, New York, and Erie County, Pennsylvania.

The Niagara, Lockport and Ontario Power Company, and the Buffalo and Lake Erie Traction Company, which has been organized.

BACK TO FARM FOR GOVERNOR

The governor talks very earnestly about his farm, from which he will make daily trips to his office, and he will devote his spare time to scientific farming, as taught by the agricultural college at Columbia. He starts his agricultural venture with three horses, two cows, and eleven hogs.

BATONS MAKE MURDERER?

It was learned at the coroner's office yesterday that the investigation has begun, and that the body of Straus has been turned over to his relatives, a statement was made that it is probable an autopsy will be performed.

The steamer Osiris sailed from Hamburg Jan. 1, and from Antwerp Jan. 3 for Callao. Presumably she touched at Montevideo, where the Cooks are said to have boarded her, but her call there has not been reported.
